When President Harrison's administration came into power it was promptly announced that especially all Presidential appointments were to be allowed to serve out the time for which they had been appointed. Among such officers, Postmaster General Wanamaker voluntarily informed Senator Wade Hampton, that the Postmaster at Columbia, South Carolina should retain his place in accordance with the statement of the President. And Mr. Wanamaker went still further and stated to Gen. Hampton that no change should be made without the Senator being notified. It appears, however, that the removal of the Columbia Postmaster is being quietly effected without Senator Hampton's knowledge, except what he saw in the newspapers. After the Senator informed himself of what was going on he addressed the Postmaster General the following pithy letter:

I shall know better in future what reliance to place on statements emanating from the same source.
