12,000 BARRELS OF BEER LOST .-- An explosion in the large brewery of Charles Trefz at Newark, N. J., on the 2d inst., damaged the establishment to the extent of more than \$100, 000 and caused consternation throughout the neighborhood. Simultaneously with the explosion floods of beer gushed from the rear windows and poured down Beacon street toward South Orange avenue and across Rankin street to the houses below. The atmosphere in the vicinity was impregnated with | G ammonia. The explosion burst loose the three floors from wall to wall, letting the great vats down upon the ground floor with a deafening crash. Repeated explosions followed as ammonia and ice-cold air met. The accident is supposed to have been caused by the bursting of one of the ammonia pipes connected with the patent ice machine. It is estimated that 12,000 barrels of beer were lost.
