OBITUARY. Joseph I. Roche.

On Sunday last, 5th inst., Mr. Joseph I. Roche aged 33 years, died at the residence of his parents at Mt. Washington. The deceased was the eldest son of Michael and Emily A. Roche. He attended Rock Hill College and Loyola College, and received a thorough education, passing high in all the studies. After leaving school he was connected with his father in the latter's business for several years. In 1875 he removed to Philadelphia, and was a clerk with H. P. and W. P. emith, in the wholesale dry goods business. He remained there for two years, and returned to Baltimore and entered for a short time the service of the Northern Central Railway. This position he left to accept another with the tobacco importing firm of John H. Fowler & Co. Mr. S. De Castro, who was in the firm withdrew and went into business with Frederick Dubarry & Co., New York. Mr. Roche went with Mr. De Castro to New York, and remained there for some time. Desiring to be near his family and cured a position as a member of the reportorial corps of the Baltimore Herald. He showed so much ability and sagacity in the selection of news and his mode of gaining it that he was offered a position on The American, which he accepted. He served in the capacity of a reporter for three years, and the business management marking his executive ability transferred him to the business office, of which he had charge up to the time of his illness. He was was for some time the Baltimore correspondent of the New York World, St. Louis Post Dispatch and other papers, but he gave them up when he was taken ill. Mr. Roche was never married. He was one of the original promoters and organizers of the Journalists' Club and served as its President in 1886. The Baltimore American in noticing his death said: The death of Mr. Joseph I. The Committee on Roads Meet.—The Commitee on Roads, G. W. Lurman, 1st District; Wm. M. Isaac, 2d; C. O. Rhodes, 8d; Chas. A. Councilman, 4th; Daniel Beckley, 5th; Geo. B. Hampehire, 6th; Christopher Slade, 7th; L. M. Bacon, 8th; Major John I. Yellott, 9th; Mr. Josiah Sparks, 10th; Fami. M. Rankin, 11th; Thos. B. Todd, 12th, and James nhouse, 18th, met in the office of the School Board at Towson on Wednesday, 8th inst.
Mr. Jamos E. Green read au article on roads and

so as to allow each District to have an extra levy if they wanted it. He also suggested as to the expenditures that the citizens of each District send in the names of persons suitable for Road Commissioners to the County Commissioners. He instanced the good work done by Messrs. G. W. Lurman, Peter Link and Michael Wal'ace in the 1st District, where there are but few dirt roads. The lat District has a stone crusher which is capable of breaking up the hardest stone, and it has proven to be of immense advantage. The machine was brought to the knowledge of Mr. Lurman by the late Thomas Winans. Mr. Lurman owns the crusher and delivers stone to any part of his District for \$2 per perch. The heaviest expense is in preparing nigger-head stone by breaking it with dynamite cartridges on top of a boulder and covering it with dirt. The action of dynamite being downwards the stone is broken. It costs 20 cents a perch to break the stone when on the platform of the crusher. McClanahan & Co., of Port Deposit, furnishes stone at 80 cents per ton; freight on same to Catonsville 67 cents per perch. They have a crusher that breaks up a perch of stone per minute. Mr. Lurman said it would be cheaper to get stone from McClanahan & Co. to such points where it could be delivered at points along a railroad. Oyster shells cost \$2 per perch and are not so durable. He also said that Sec. 8 of the Road Law should be amended so as to impose a penalty for obstruction of waterways or ditches. Wm. M. Isaac said that every system should have its proper head, and that is the need of the present read law. There ought to be a competent engineer appointed who should have control of the roads and should lay them off by sections and divisions, so as to show where the money was spent, and accounts should be published so as to show exactly what was done with the road funds. He believed it best to leave the appointment of the Road Commissioners in the hands of the County Commissioners, as they are smenable to the people who have the power to change them every two years by election. He was in favor of an audit of road accounts, the same as the public school accounts, which is published annually and shows where every cent of money goes. Now, if every road was laid out by section and District, so much could be estimated for each section, and the bills published would soon let them know where the money was wasted. Every law is good if properly carried out.

Mr. C. C. Rhodes, 3d District, gave his views at length, and said he was opposed to any radical change in the present law. Charles A. Councilman, 4th District, was in favor of raising the road tax all over the county to 25 cents on the \$100. He thought it would be better to have one fifth of the road tax set apart for the General Road and Bridge Fund, and the balance of the road to be divided into thirteen equal parts, each District to receive an equal share. Mr. Jacob B. Hampshire, 6th District, was opposed to any additional taxation, but wanted betier roads. He would rather have the roads as they are than to stand any heavier taxation.
