The Road Meeting in Towson.-The murky going to throw a damper on the practical solution of the road question by preventing that large attendance of people who were present on the first day, but before the hour of meeting it was seen that there were a large number of people gathering to have the matter discussed. The Committee of Thirteen appointed at the previous meeting held a session in one of the jury rooms in the Court House, all the members being present except Mr. C. C. Rhodes, 3d District, and Mr. Oregon R. Benson, 18th The Convention was called to order by Mr. C. Lyon Rogers, and Mr. Sam'l Brady, 3d District, was called to preside in the absence of Mr. John S. Bidlison, who was unable to be present, with Mr. Jas. I. Green as Pecretary. Mr. Brady on taking the chair thanked the meeting for the honor conferred and hoped the business of the meeting would be transacted to the satstaction of every one present. On motion of Mr. C. Lyon Rogers, Col. Charles B Rogers was appointed a committee of one to notify the Committee of Thirteen that the Convention was waiting for their report. Col. Rogers reported to the Chairman of the Convention that the committee would be in readiness in a short time During the delay S. C. Tomay, 9th District, sugrested that as quite a number of gentlemen present ad papers or resolutions on the road question that

t would save time to lay them before the Convenion while waiting for the committee. Mr. John Glenn, 1st District, questioned the propriety of embarrassing the Convention with any natters before the committee made its report which would no doubt occupy the entire time ( he Convention. The Chair suggested that such matters could come before the Convention for its consideration until such time as the committee was ready to report, and the committee's report would take precedence At this juncture Major John I. Yellott appeared and announced that as Chairman of the committee he was ready to report. He submitted a majority report which favored the present Road Law, with the exception of certain amendments as follows Section 3, to be amended so that the Road Com missioners would be required to post in publi places in the several Districts the prices they would pay for stone or other hard material to be delivered on the roads where required.

Section 5, to be amended so that no bill or claim shall be paid until it had laid in the office of the County Commissioners to be op n to the inspection of the tax payers of the District who may chose t

nquire into the same. Section 7, to be amended making it the duty the County Commissioners to have all the roads marked and designated by sections, and the mileage of the same ascertained by the 1st of Decem-Section 11, to be amonded so that one-half of th axes from each District shall be set aside for the Jeneral Road and Bridge Fund, and the other half Major Yellott then stated that he was in favor a change of the whole road system, but that the committee had not agreed to his proposition and he would therefore submit the following minority re "That the present Road Law of Baltimore county n connection with the General Road Law of the tate, is amply sufficient for all practical purposes f properly administered with two simple amend ments, viz: an amendment giving to the County ommissioners the power to make special levies for such Districts as may require the same for the per manent improvement of the roads of such District and a further amendment more expressly prohibit ing any Road Commissioner from working his own inds upon the roads, and providing for giving out of the mending of roads upon the contract system Mr. Wm. M. Isaac stated that as a member of the committee he had not heard anything of a minority eport in the committee, and he was in favor of th ajority report being acted upon. Mr. G. W. Lurman said he was in favor of the inority report and hoped it would be adopted. Mr. A. Lynn Painter was opposed to the majority report and was in favor of the minority. He gave v reasons why the present law would meet all the requirements needed. Mr. Wm. M. Isaac offered an amendment that the minority report be rejected, which was lost. Mr. John Glenn gave his views at length, and was in favor of the minority report. Mr. L. M. Bacon was in favor of a more equal distribution of the road tax, so that the wealthier Districts, where all the bond, and other valuable properties were, should aid the poorer Districts to a better road system. He said that the lower Districts had from \$200 to \$300 per mile to spend upon their roads, while some of the upper Districts had not more than \$15 per mile.

Mr. A. L. Painter, 3d District, was in favor of a fair distribution of the road funds, and though the present law met the necessities of the case if was properly carried out. Mr. Josiah Sparks, 10th District, was in favor of an increase of the General Road and Bridge Fund, so that the upper Districts might be enabled to put Mr. E. F. Raphael, 11th District, was in favor of an ncrease of the General Road and Bridge Fund .-He did not consider that either report went far enough in that particular. He said the money was not properly spent now, and gave as an instance where a road machine had been sent into the 11th District by the County Commissioners and had never been used, and when a Road Supervisor was asked about it he said, "The dom'd thing wouldn't work." [A voice said the machine couldn't vote. Continuing he said, put the roads into the hands of the proper men and there will be a vast improve-

Mr. Thomas Owings, 9th District, was opposed to a change in the Road Law, which proposed to spend the money collected in the lower Districts to make roads in the upper Districts, which were rarely used by citizens of the lower Districts, while the upper Districts make use of all the roads near the city.
Mr. G. W. Lurman said the basis of taxation of the lower Districts was three-fourths of the entire county basis, and certainly he thought they were doing now more than their share of paying county Mr. S. M. Rankin, 11th District, was opposed to the minority report and was in favor of an increase in the General Road and Bridge Fund, and was oppored to any extra taxation. Mr. E. J. Farber, 1st District, said that whatever the outcome of this agitation of the road question it would do good, and it would put the people to work to improve the system and keep a careful watch on the expenditure of the taxes levied for such purposes.

Talbott, Miss Sophia Talbott and Miss Ray To Locate the County Roads.—The following order, offered by Mr. Robert Magruder in the Board of County Commissioners in relation to the roads, was passed: OFFICE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS BALTIMORE CO.. Towson, Mp., January 15th, 1890. In order that it may be ascertained how many niles of county roads there are in Baltimore county, and that the same may be laid off in mile sec ons or other proper sub-divisions, and that all money to be hereinafter expended upon any such ctions or sub-divisions may be duly accounte for by the Road Commissioners of the several Districts in such manner that the Chief Clerk and Auditor of the Board can audit such accounts so as o show in detail how much money has been exnended in each of said sections during the year, and what character of road materials have been used in making and repairing the same : by whom the same has been done, whether by day work or by contract, or by whose authority; and that the chief Clerk and Auditor of this Board shall annually make up a statement for publication in pam phiet form by this Board showing the expenditure on each section for the year ending May 31st, and each succeeding year; therefore be it Resolved by this Board, That Charles B. McClean County Surveyor, and Wm. H. Shipley, Superintendent of Bridges, are hereby appointed to take charge of such work. They shall proceed forthwith and make a complete Road and Bridge Record for Baltimore county, and have the same com pleted not later than the 1st day of May next. This record shall contain the names of all county roads and all other important avenues or thorough fares: the actual length, width and grade of the said county roads, as well as their condition; whether macadamized or not, and whether the same was acquired by deed or condemnation: it shall also con tain the names and number of all the culverts and bridges in the county on county roads, their location, manner of construction, estimated cost and present condition. After having acquired this inormailou they shall divide the said county roads nto sections, giving the distances of each section, and the beginning and ending of the same, which sections or sub-divisions shall be styled District 1. Road 1. Section 1. &c., &c. They shall state the whereabouts of the nearest and most suitable ma terial available for the repair and improvement of each section or sub-division of roads, and the ascer tained cost of the same delivered on said road, and

any other information or auggestions which, in their judgment, will be useful for future reference. They shall, for the purpose of facilitating said work, have access to all the plats and records of this office. They shall be paid for their services. such compensation as may be agreed upon between the County Commissioners and themselves, and their report shall be under oath; and it is further Resolved. That the Auditor shall provide suitable books for the several Boards of Road Commissioners, so that the records, proceedings and accounts of the said Boards shall be kept in the manner specified as aforesaid; and he shall hereafter keep an account of the General Road and Bridge Fund as well as the District Road Fund of the several Districts in such a manner that the same will show how much of each has been expended in each mile section or sub-division of roads in each District of
