A Strike at Wilkens' Hair Factory .- On the 1st inst. the hair spinners at Wilkens' factory quit work on account of the firm taking three appretices. As soon as it was known among the bair spinners considerable discontent was evinced, be cause some members of the Hair Spinners' Union were ont of work. The Union then held a meeting on Friday afternoon, and it was decided that the spinners would not go to work unless the apprenices were dropped. Saturday morning the ners and apprentices reported at the factory. When he men saw the apprentices they told the foreman, Mr. August Steinwedel, that they would not go to vork unless the apprentices were discharged It was against the rules of the Union to have anprentices as long as there were hair spinners out of employment. If all the spinners in the city were mployed, then the apprentices could be hired.-The foreman told them he did not intend to discharge the boys. He told them also it was strange for them to object to young men doing exactly what they had done. All of them had been apprentices, and learned their trade at Wilkens' facory. The men, however, did not return to work. and the other workmen were compelled to remain idle because they quit.

Grangers Requested to Dust Themselves .-Mr. Wm. H. Murray, Master of the Maryland State Grange, has, in a circular, letter urged upon the Grangers throughout the State to get up and dust themselves, by endeavoring to increase the numerical strength of the Order. For this purpose he recommends that each Grange should divide up the territory in their limits and go among farmers who are not members and urge them to unite themselves with the Grange. The week beginning February 17th is recommend as a suitable time. The Master of the State Grange says: 'The farmers realize that something must be done and a very little argument will convince them that we must organize and help ourselves in the various ways that are possible to organized forces." Farmers are pretty neavily pressed at the present time, as, in fact, are all classes of business, save the vast moneyed and trust corporations which have millions of dollars locked up in their vaults hoping for a big rate of nterest from something of some Micawber-like thing that is expected to turn up. Richard Stockett Mathews. The people of Baltimore were greatly shocked on Saturday evening 1st inst. to learn of the sudden leath of Mr. R. Stockett Mathews, which occurred in a street car upon the Frick line when opposite the Johns Hopkins University on Howard street.—Mr. Mathews dined happily with his family at 4.30 at his residence, 928 North Charles street. When he left his residence he passed through his stables, conversing with a stable attendant. He afterwards stepped upon a Frick line car at Richmond Market. and almost immediately upon to king hisseat a lady noticed that his head dropped upon his breast, and he did not move. When the car arrived opposite the Johns Hopkins the passengers saw he was dead but no one knew him. Or. Hammeter, who had just came out of the Johns Hopkins, seeing a commotion in the car went to it, and found Mr. Mathews dead. The car then went on to the corner of Franklin street, where Mr. Mathews' body was \$2,000. carried into the counting room of Rinehart, Childs & Co. and laid upon a lounge.
