It was discovered last time by Tycho de Brahe in 1572, who described it as a star of extraordinary brightness, which outshone the stars of first magnitude, and could be seen in the light of day. But after three weeks the brightness faded, and after having been visible for seventeen months t disappeared as suddenly as it had come. The tar is on record in the annals of 1264 A. D., and of 45 A. The Grand Jury was sworn by Court Clerk Mr. Lewis M. Bacon, and Judge Burke delivered the charge to them as follows : "Gentlemen of the Grand Jury :- It has become a custom for the Presiding Judge at the beginning of each term of Court to make such observations and suggestions to the Grand Jury concerning the nature and extent, importance and responsibilities of the duties which they have been called together to perform, as he may think the occasion requires. and also to direct their attention specially to such matters of public nature and concern as he may consiner involved in the proper discharge of their duty. But, gentlemen, you will understand that whatever may be said to you in this connection is solely ad visory in its character and is only suggested in the hope that it may be of some benefit to the public, and likewise be of some assistance and guidance to you in the performance of your very important and solemn public duties.

In this convection the first consideration which desire to suggest to you is, that it is your duty to inquire into all offences of an indictable characer committed within the limits of this county, and for this purpose you constitute a part of this Court in the administration of the criminal law. No one can be put upon trial for any crime unless he be first accused in solemn form by yourselves. In the performance of this duty the question whether s given law is wise or unwise, whether it ought to be repealed or amended, ought not to control you in your action. You will deal with the law and the fact as you find them. The indictable offenses to which I have alluded have been classified and divided by the law into felonies and misdemeanors. Felonies embrace such offenses as arson, burglary, larceny, manslaughter, mayhem, murder, rap robbery, &c. such violations of the life, property and personal security of the citizen have, among all civilized nations, been justly regarded as very n this mighty warfare for God, Home and Native great crimes. They strike at the very foundati of social law and order, and their perpetiators should be promptly indicted and vigorously prose-cuted. Mudemeanors include such offenses as assault and battery, disturbance of the public peace,

riots, drunkenness upon the public highways. A great portion of the time of this Court at each term s consumed in the trial of this latter class of of enses. My experience at the bar and as prosec ting attorney for this county, has convinced me that at least one half of the cases of this sort of misdemeanors, in the trial of which a large portion of the time of this Court, and large sums of the taxpayers money is consumed, originate purely in private anite and malice, and in such cases it is impossible for the State's officer to secure convictions. Again. a large percentage of indictments for misdemeanors are for such trivial and technical violations of law that no convictions can be had upon full hearing. The result is that the taxpayers must settle up the costs of trial. The administration of justice at best is an expensive business, but I believe, and am bound to say, that if Grand Juries would exercise a wise discretion and discriminating judgment in dealing with the ordinary class of misdemeanors which come before them or investigation, the pub lic interest would be well subserved and much a the expense attending the administration of criminal law in this Court avoided."
