An Associated Press dispatch from New York,
Monday night, 94th inst., announced the failure of
the oid-established dry goods house of Ross Campbell & Co., No. \$17 Church street, New York city, tormerly of Baltimore. The partners, Wm. H. Bayne and Bushrod R. Bayne, of New York, and Mrs Eliza Jane ('ampbell, of Baltimore, made a general assignment to William H. Tailer, giving the professions of the basic start. general assignment to William H. Tailer, giving a preference for \$1,500. The business was started about fifty years ago in Baltimore and the New York house has been in existence twenty-five years. The Baltimore house was on South Sharp street, near German street. The firm was known as Campbell, McGee & Co. up to 1869, when the name was changed to Ross Campbell & Co. Bradstreet's reports state that Ross Campbell, who was the capitalist, died in Baltimore March 3d, 1876. W. H. Bayne and Charles M. Roache continued the Baltimere business of the old firm under the style of Ross Campbell & Co., with Mrs. Eliza J. Campbell, widow of Ross Campbell, as special partner for \$50,000, and E. W. & W. H. Tailer took the New York widow of Russ Campbell, as special partner for \$50,000, and E. W. & W. H. Tailer took the New York business. The firm afterwards made New York their headquarters and discontinued the Baltimore branch December 31st, 1887, Charles M. Roche and

George S. Campbell withdrawing on that date. It is said that the expenses of running the two houses in New York and Baltimore were too large for the profits. On January 11th, 1888, a new co-partner-ship was formed, with Mrs. Edza J. Campbell as a President of the Powhatan Manufacturing Company, cotton and woolen, Baltimore and Powhatan, Md. This Company was incorporated December Md. This Company was incorporated December 10th, 1886, with a capital stock of \$65,000, of which \$50,000 was said to have been issued to the estate of Ross Campbell & Co. for the mills. Ross Campbell & Co. were, up to January 1st, the agents for Joseph P. Murphy, manufacturer of cotton and woolen goods, at Philadelphia, who failed for \$482,000, and offered to compromise at 40 per cent, in 6, 12, 18 and 24 months. W. H. Bayne said at the time of

Father Lenaghan had had occasion to reprimand McNicholas for drinking and for not attending to some work. This was quite early in the morning, and the time drawing near for the appearance of the funeral cortege, Father Lenaghan told McNicholas to be sure and properly attended to the ringing of the bell. McNicholas turned on his heel and went to his quarters in the beautern of the accordance of the constitute of the expense allowed by the road law of the county. to his quarters in the basement of the school-house, which is near the rear of the church. The priest returned to the reading of his office. He was attired in the street garb of a pastor, and did not have on his caseck. In a few minutes the sexton came out, and with a demented grin, approached Father Lenaghan with the remark:
"Father, I am going to kill you."
The priest was to astonished to make an audible reply at first: but seeing at a glance the ugly-looking weapon the sexton had in his hand, he exclinimed:

cinimed:

"My God, man! you would de nothing like that?"
McNicholas, in reply, chuckled, and pulled the trigger. The pistol was thirty-eight caliber English buil-dog pattern. The first shot missed its mark, and its only effect was to scare Father Lanaghan and start him on a run across the field adjoining the church. The sexton pulled the trigger a second time and the hullet took effect on the side of the priest's ankie, penetrating the fleshy part.

Then there was a very lively chase. Five workmen, who were pulling down the walls of the parsonage, which was burned down five weeks ago, sought seclusions in different directions, and got away as fast as they could. One sought refuge in the graveyard, but none ran after McNicholas, who was pursuing the priest and firing at him with the revolver. After the second shot the race between the priest and the crazy sexton was witbetween the priest and the crazy sexton was wit nessed by quite a number of people from a safe distance. Father Lenaghan ran in a circuit route, and all the time gained the lead upon McNicholas, who fired the five shots as rapidly as he could conveniently take aim and pull the trigger. Father Lenaghan ran about three or four hundred Father Lenaghan ran about three or four numered yards, and came out on the pike through an opening in a pailing fence. Here the wounded priest was taken in a fainting condition to the house of John T. Shay and Dr. B. F. Bussey was summoned. In his flight the priest used his lungs to their full capacity, and on the fourth shot he dropped his prayer-book, and it fell from his right hand to the ground. On the fifth shot two letters followed the prayer-book, and he called to McNicholas: "For haven's sake don't shoot any more." heaven's sake don't shoot any more."

Dr. Bussey probed for the bundle and extracted one. Father Lenaghan was removed in a carriage to the home of Mr. Michael Padian. In the afternoon Dr. Bussey came to Baltimore and returned to Texas with Professor Tiffany. The bullets were located and extracted. Dr Bussey said the wounds were all and extracted. Dr Bussey said the wounds were all in the fleshy part of the leg, and the only danger to be feared is from blood poisoning. Father Lenaghan was resting very easily last night, and suffered very little pain. Rev. Francis Patrick Duggan, paster of Plus Memorial Church, and Rev. Cornelius Thomas, paster of the Church of the Sacred Heart, of Mount Washington, went to his bedying as soon as they heard of the abouting

bedwide as soon as they heard of the shooting. The wounded priest is about 40 years old, and is a nephew of Father P. B. Lenaghan, the pastor of St. Joseph's Church, who is now in Florida for his health. After the shooting McNicholas returned to his room and reloaded his pistol. He then left through the graveyard and was standing near the through the graveyard, and was standing near the railroad switch when arrested, at the point of a pistol, by County Officer John Banahan

McNicholas had been sexton of the church for about a year. He came from the Baltimore County Alma House, where he had been for some time on account of an injury to his hand, which he received while working on the Northern Central Railway .-He is 29 years of age and unmarried. He was addicted to drink, and was considered partially insane by residents of Texas. He was, however, always

outspoken in telling how well the priest treated When the present house was burned down, five weeks ago, McNicholas was the one to discover the fire. It was 8 o'clock in the morning, and he called until he aroused Father Lenaghan, who had a very narrow escape in getting out.

McNicholas was seen at Towson Jail after being taken there from Texas. He said he was sorry, and he hoped Father Lenaghan was not badly hurt. Special Officer Banahan told how he arrested him near the railroad and added: "He is a little off," and is a great drinker. Before I arrested him he had taken a drink at a tavern near the railroad. On approaching him I covered him with my revolver, and took away his. I then hired a dayton and took the prisoner over to Towson. I placed the handcuffs on him when I arrested him to make him realize his situation and act peaceably. After a short time I
