

THE LEGISLATURE ADJOURNS

The session of the Legislature of 1889 closed at 12 o'clock midnight on the 31st inst., having expired by constitutional limitation.

Among the members of the Legislature were a new generation of voters, present registration being secured; and when the people have an opportunity to read the law they will be satisfied that it is a reasonable measure, calculated to secure greater purity of elections.

Another important law desired by the people of the State is the Assessment law, so that all shades of property might be brought to bear its share of the public burdens.

Other measures adopted are five different acts submitting to the voters propositions to amend the Constitution.

As far as Baltimore county is concerned her delegates asked for two new road laws, and another High License law, for the better control of the liquor traffic.

Delegate Rich also took a high position, and proved himself one of the ablest debaters of the House. He was the peer of any of the expression of the views of the Legislature.

Col. McCabe took little part in debate, but he was literally a working man. His championship of the Bell Line Railroad was his chief contribution.

Some earnestness of purpose characterized the action of Messrs. Wm. Slade, Frank Parlett and Dr. H. W. Drach, each of whom were faithful attendants.
