Dear Journal:—Now that the genial sun is blessing us with his invigorating rays is the time for the denizen of the large city to visit our section and cast about for some lovely nook as a place of sojourn for his family for the summer. Here he can in a short time reach his place of business in the city, carrying with him an abundant reservoir of fresh air in his lungs to last him through the day, and can afford to his over-worked wife and to his children isgaed out by the year's schooling the com-fort and recreation so needed to begin the next win-ter on; where they can have abundant supply of fresh milk, good unfillered water and fresh air, which is as much a food as is fresh beef. You can scarcely ride along our roads without seeing in some form or other mineral matter which with care and capital could be made available. To even the amateur geologist and minerologist this section of our county is replete with beautiful specimeus, and it would be a source of much pursuit, pleasure and future profit in manhood if each boy would give some little time to the search after and study of quartz, the different forms of sand stone, of the various marbles which abound

throughout our hills and the vast quantities of valuable iron ore which will soon come into market by the help of our new railroad. rections far less interesting and productive than the old 4th District have developed wonders in phosphate rock, gypsum and mari, simply by having a few residents who give attention to such de-posits and think enough of them and of the welfare of their State to bring them to the notice of fertilizer manufacturers. Much wealth has thus peen poured into the lap of South Carolina by her phosphate developments and into the pockets of the northern neck of Virginia by her fish manures. At one time it was unpleasant to ride along the roads of some of the eastern rivers of North Carolina, the fields on each side being covered inches deep with decaying refuse of fish caught in the Chowan and other rivers. Just as there is nothing like fish food to develop the brain, so we have the best results from spreading fish manure over the land. See how certain forms of guano some 30 years ago were filled with the bones and feathers of the wild fowl which bred upon and hovered about the Patagonian shores, showing the make up of the manure and see the immense fortunes made.

We are blessed in this section in escaping the destructive blizzards and cyclones which devastate

large districts in the West and along the Ohio Valley, and the vast inundations we have lately been reading of along the great streams as that in Bolivar Co., Miss., with crevasses a third of a mile in width, flooding the beautiful town of Greenville more than a foot in depth, the water making its way across the pavements even into the stores. In some neighborhoods along the great river whole families are rendered homeless and destitute, their little savings of last year's crops being washed miles down the maddening waters—indeed o such flood occurring since 1851. Here our la deare elevated, our soil firm, our grass sod stable, and we can sit in our comfortable houses and laugh at the raging storms. We are not much troubled like some of our city neighbors by the passage of the Pool bill. Our oc-cupations are too stable to be affected by such enetments. We are content to profit by the work of our horses and not by winnings on distant competing steeds. Our railroad meeting was held at Glyndon lately with results already known to you. We have no expectation but that soon our slumbers will be ightly disturbed by the whistles of the many trains passing along our Dover Valley, bringing us fairly and with profit into the world proper. I see that Baltimore is doing a good thing in requiring that the Union R. R. shall cross the streets above ground in thickly settled portions of the city, and it is to be hoped for the benefit of another portion of our county that the coming Belt R. R. will be required to do much of its work in an underground way. An excellent thing for our State generally is the appointing by our Governor an Arbor day, which, if properly observed, will do much to compensate for

the wholesale destruction of our forests, which is of ten the cause of disastrous floods permitting the too rapid shedding of water during protracted storms. It is to be hoped, too, that the effect will be to deter much of the destruction by belting and other means farmers to cultivete less acr age of land and to cultivate it more thoroughly. This is the secret of good farming in England and in the North. Canada did well in giving a start to this idea of Arbor day.-But Arbor day more especially refers to the planting of fruit and shade trees by ladies and children. I is a pretty and a useful idea, and will soon becoma custom. It is to be hoped the day will arrive in the Romans gave them. A few brief years ago Ar bor day was something of a novelty, but now is becoming fairly general-the larger States having even two Arbor days for different portions of the afford both beauty and profit. In planting shade trees about the house care should be given to leave always about 50 feet between the trees and the house that the healthy sunshine and plenty of fresh air may prevail.
