Burned Loss About \$9,500, On? Tuesday morning, 15th inst., about a quarter to 4 o'clock the residents of Towson, were again, terribly alarmed by the cries of "Fire! "Fire!" and there was soon a hurrying from all directions of persons who had donned their clothing and ran to the scene. All went to work with a will to aid their neighbors in staying the progress of the devouring flames.

The fire, which is thought to have been of an in cendiary origin, broke out in the stable of Mr. J. A New Electric Road in Operation.-A new electric road from the junction of Division street-and North Avenue, Baltimore, to Highland lark, 3d District, Baltimore county, a distance of 2 miles, was put into operation on Tuesday. The cars are operated by the Sprague system, an overhead wire, the same as the electric cars used last summer at Bay Ridge. On the top of each car is a pole, attached to it by flexible springs, tending always to the verticle, and on the end of the pole a pair of fluid conveyed to the motive-power of the car. The essential difference between a car of this kind and an ordinary horse car is in the trucks, for here the entire mrchinery is located in a small, compact space entirely hidden from sight beneath the floor. The current from the trolleys pass into two dynamos of fifteen horse power each, located near the two axles, to which the motive power is conveyed by on Saturday night, showing the rise and fall of the gearing.
