drama, "The Dark Secret." A Condemnation Jury .- The jury of inquiion under Sheriff Charles J. Beckley, which has had under consideration the matter of the condemnation of a right of way for the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company through the property of the Canton Company, at Canton, rendered a verdict on Saturday, 19th inst., in favor of the Canton Company for the sum of \$98,436. In November, 1884. the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company cutered into a written agreement with the Canton Company for the sale of a right of way for its road from Lombard street to Clinton street, containing nearly twelve acres of land, with the right to the Ba more and Ohio to take possession of the land at once, and after the road was constructed, if the two corporations failed to agree, then the question of damages was to be referred to two arbitrators to fix the same, with an allowance of 5 per cent. interest from December 1, 1884, on the amount allowed.— The parties failed to agree, and two gentlemen were solicited to assess the damages, who made an award in July, 1886, for the amount of \$140,000. This award the Court of Appears declared null and void, and proceedings of condemnation were taken out by the B. & O., and the jury fixed the damages at per cent, for use of the land by the railroad company as agreed upon from December 1st, 1884. out guilty of manslaughter. Judge Burke then said: "Christopher, you have pleaded guilty to the crime of manslaughter for the killing of Charles P. Logue, and your counsel in your behalf have accompanied your submission with a statement of reasons which have induced you to submit to a plea of manslaughter. I am now about to pronounce propounced? Christopher replied that he had nothing to say. The Judge resuming, said : "You have been twice tried upon this indictment and in both trials the jury divided upon the ques-tion of your guit. The cost of these trials have necessarily been very heavy. I have been informed that they aggregate a sum reaching nearly \$1,500. The jury which heard your case in this Court was composed of gentlemen of the very best character and of most excellent judgment. The counsel for the State with much ability and zeal contended fo a conviction of murder in the second degree. Your

own counsel with equal ability and earnestness insisted that you were guilty of no offense against the law; that your act was that of self-defense, and that you were entitled to a prompt acquittal. Hav-ing presided at the trial of your case in this Court, I gave the closest attention to the testimony adduced against you, and having analyzed it closely, and considering all its probabilities and improbabilities and assigned to each fact the proper weight, and in explanation of the sentence which I am about to impose, I desire to say that if your case had been tried before me I would have been bound to acquit you under the law. The law invests in the Court a very wide discretion in imposing sentence for the crime of manslaughter. I have power to impose a fine or imprisonment, or both. I am only limited as to the maximum of punishment. In view therefore, of your submission to a pies of manslaughter, and the opinion which I entertain as to the nature of your act gathered from the testimony adduced at your trial, the judgment of the Court is that you pay a fine of \$100 and costs."

Wheels of fortune, &c. And in fact anhmit for your consideration that are calculated to produce income. In the matter of abuses, we suggest that the privileges of stockholders be either for the present entirely suspended or at least limited to a single admission of the holder, and not permitting compeition for money prizes without fully paid entrance

We find upon careful inspection that it is in much better shape than t has been in previous years, and are satisfied that the work done on it last year and the precautions taken to prevent its washing was judicious and money well spent. And we would recommend that the improvements be continued this year and commenced as soon as practicable, well knowing that it is impossible to obtain entries from a good class of horses to trot over a miserable, hard, and uneven track. As racing has become the principal attraction at all agricultural fairs, it behooves us to offer every inducement in the way of a good track and other accommodations to try and draw a better class horses than heretofore, for the better the class f horses the greater the attraction.
We would particularly recommended that the first turn be widened and the outside thrown up at the rate of one inch to the foot. The second turn and lower part of the back stretch should also be graded. It is our opinion that the judges' stand should be moved down to at least the lower end of the paddock which now enclosed it, which would give longer home stretch and show much better finish. We would further recommend that after the track is put in order it be rented, if at only a nominal rent, provided a suitable tenant can be secured, who

will keep it in order and look after the interest of S. G. CROCKER. ARAND JURY REPORT.

MARCH TERM. 1890. To the Honorable the Judges of the Circuit Court for Baltimore County: The Grand Jury for the March Term, 1890, hav ing finished their labors, respectfully report through their Foreman that they have been in session in days, docketed 107 cases, examined 59 Magistrates, issued 353 summonses, examined 343 witnesses found 61 presentments, ignored 1 and found 60 true bills of indictment. The fact that the return of fines imposed by Magistrates had been extremely small from March 1st, 1889, to March 1st. 1890, notwithstanding the strenuous efforts of the School Board through their counsel to collect the same, having been brought to their attention, they decided to examine the Magis-trates of the county. The Treasurer had received \$21 and the School Board \$19.50 during the above there were some few instances of gross neglect. It is the opinion of this Jury that Magistrates should remit fines imposed to the Treasurer of Baltimore County as soon as they are collected, the facilities

for doing so by mail being ample from any part of the county. The fact that the county may be in-debted to them is no excuse for withholding money law against the sale of liquor on Sunday and to minors, but sufficient evidence that would justify conviction in Court was difficult to obtain, and they were, therefore, compelled to passover cases though morally convinced that the law had been violated. It is to be hoped that the high license law, passed at the recent session of the Legislature, will do much to weed out those who are unworthy to be trusted with the sale of liquor, and that it will also, in connection with the law passed enlarging the jurisdiction of Magistrates, do much toward ightening the duties of Grand Juries, and obviate A committee has visited the Jail on several occa

the necessity for the long sessions that are now se costly to the county. A committee has visited the Jan on several occa-sions, and on April 8th the Jury made an inspec-tion. They found the Jail in the same condition that was reported by the last Grand Jury, not a single recommendation having been heeded. Every one of those recommendations are endorsed, and it s useless to reiterate them in detail. The County Commissioners offer as an excuse for this delay the present low condition of the Treasury, but they have given to this Jury every assurance that the Jail will be renovated and put in a safe and sani tary condition at once. If these promises are not fulfilled before the adjournment of the Grand Jury for the May Term, it is recommended that prompt action be taken in the premises. A final visit was paid to the Jail by the committee this morning.— There are now 41 prisoners confined, 31 serving sentences, 5 recommended to be dismissed, 7 awaiting trial and 1 referred to the next Grand Jury. On April 10th the Grand Jury visited the Alms House at their own expense. The farm is in good condition; a fine crop of growing wheat is in the front field, and the stock is in good order. The woodwork of the main building, especially the porches, is badly in need of paint and should be attended to at once as a question of economy. The stone lintel over the north door is cracked and may cause serious damage to the north wall. This should be examined by a competent builder and made secure. The building was inspected from garret to cellar, as were also the outbuildings, and their condition was in every respect creditable to the Superintendent, Mr. Cole. There is a good deal of decayed wood in the laundry and drying room which should be taken out and be replaced by a cement floor. There were 65 inmates, and they were apparently well cared for, comfortable and content. The committee appointed to examine the books f the Treasurer have reported that they found them in a neat and satisfactory condition, and that the system in practice is simple, systematic and ffective. It is recommended that a Special Officer be apcointed for Govanstown and vicinity. Its close

proximity to the city renders it liable to visitations of disorderly men, and the number of assault case brought to the attention of this Jury justify its citizens in their urgent demand for proper police pro-In conclusion the Jury beg to tender their sincere thanks to the Honorable Judges, the State's Attorney, officials and employees connected with the Court House, for the uniform courtesy that has been extended to them during their session.
