Hamilton, the Committee, found: \$12.643,335.20 were in the vaults, made up as follows: \$147,685 United States notes, \$5,641 \$10,000 in redeemed notes, \$86,527 in silver certificates, \$5,858,792.50 in gold coin, \$8,975,898 in standard silver dollars, \$485,788.10 in fractional silver, \$9,677.46 in minor coins, \$560.52 in coupons, \$891,562 in quarterly interest checks ; redeemed certificates of deposit out of June 8, 1872, \$90,000; fractional currency, \$30; special deposits, \$980,000. In the sealed vaults, which were not counted, there were \$5,190,000 in gold, and the counters accepted the certificates for the same. [Correspondence of the Maryland Journal.] THUNBERED CORRESPONDENCE.

HARRIMAN, TENN., June 30th, 1890. Dear Editor JOURNAL: You have had one letter from Harriman, so here is another. I left Chambersburg, Pa., at 6.20 A. M., Tuesday, by the Cumberland Valley Railroad. Arriving at Hagerstown I changed cars for the Shenandoah Valley Railroad. The scenery down the Shenandoah Valley was grand. Part of the way the train followed the bank of a river, and on the other bank there were large hills thickly covered with trees.

veloped in a blue haze. One thing I noticedthere seemed to be a good many stopping places, but not much of a town. The country seems to be thinly settled. At Roanoke we changed cars for the N. & W. R. R. Two things I observed at Roanoke : on one side of the road was a large hotel with beautiful grounds, and on the other side one saloon after another, like Baltimore, and no blinds to shield the drinkers from their wives, mothers, or the public, and I thought of the time not far distant when you will be able to travel from East to West, from North to South, and not see our beautiful cities and towns marred by such a sight as these vilo traps of satan. I slept awhile, but the stopping of the train at a depot caused me to wake up, and, would you believe it, it is an actual fact, there was a sound proceeding from a berth near me that sounded something like driving pigs. After I got settled I heard another sound, and if I had been dreaming of Harriman I might have thought one of that city's saw-mills had been transplanted to the berth opposite me. As the train stopped at stations along the route I noticed that the Southern towns were far
