The Harm the English Sparrow is Doing.-Mr. Alexander McComas writes as follows to the Baltimore American: "I am not a farmer, although born on a farm. I think if the farmer would look nto this 'plenty of straw, but little wheat,' they huld not complain of nature or bad seasons, &c. but find the great fault to be the terrible nuisancethe English sparrows, which congregate in thou ands on the wheat fields at times, and pick out the grain of wheat when in the milky state. I think a thousand or so of these sparrows will ruin a ten-acre field in a few hours, so far as a yield of grain concerned. I have seen them in large flocks on the wheat fields in this vicinity. I remember some years ago the planters of the South had to employ number of men and boys with guns to drive off the rice birds to prevent the destruction of their rice crop, and these sparrows are ten times more detructive than the rice bird. I merely throw out these ideas so that abler pens than mine will take up the cause and endeavor to find a remedy to stop ne nuisance. Some few years ago our Council passed ordinance to fine any one \$2 for killing an English sparrow. I think that should be reversed, and a premium paid to persons who kill them, as they exterminate or drive away all our native birds such as blue birds, wrens, &c. They deface our dwellings, destroy the bloom on fruit trees, and, as far as my observation goes, the insects they destroy

are few and far between, and, if there is no remedy applied, in a few years the cry will be: Plenty of straw and bloom, but no grain or fruit.' Baltimore County Farmers Need Not Pay a Tax on Their Wagons .- Judge Stewart on Wednesday, 16th inst., rendered a decision against the or-dinance in the matter of a liceuse law upon county wagons bringing produce into the city of Baltimore. The case came up on demurrer filed to indictment laid against James H. Cole. Thomas G. Carier, J. Watkins Ritter, John W. Evans, Alpheus Brown and Frank R. Gatch for violating the ordinance.— Judge Stewart, in his opinion says: "The indictments, six in number, one against each of the parties above named, are framed under the provisions of the City Code, Article 3, Section 28 which, it is thought, requires them to take out license before using the streets of the city. It is admitted that all the traversers are non-residents of

Prior to the passage of the ordinance No. 97, approved May 11th, 1880, under which these parties are indicted the only authority passage has the state of the anuptial knot in the hope of receiving a libare indicted, the only authority passed by the city on the subject was that conferred by Article 4, Section 148, of the Code of Public Local Laws of 1860, which authorized the city to license and regulate carriages kept for hire and employed within the "The Act of 1880, Chapter 69, approved March 25th, 1880, extended this power to license carriages owned and used within the city, kept and used for pleasure as well as for business, and provided that the revenue should be applied to the paying or repaving of the public highways. The evident object of this law was to require the owners of carriages used for pleasure, who resided and used the same within the city, to contribute equally with those who used their carriages for hire, towards keeping the public highways in repair. "It is not necessary to enter into an argument to prove that when the Legislature conferred upon the city the power to license carriages owned and used within the city the corporation had no right, in the ordinance passed under this authority, to change the language so used or employed within "Municipal corporations have no inherent legis-

lative powers. They can only pass ordinances or perform acts which may be authorized or conferred upon them by their characters, or which can be deduced therefrom by necessary implication. When they exceed the powers granted them the acts in excess of their powers are mere "It follows that so far as the ordinance in question attempts to compel the defendants who are not residents, to take out licenses it is inoperative and void, and the defendants are each of them declared not guilty."
Mr. John F. Gontrum, of the Baltimore county bar, argued the demurrer in all the above cases before Judge Stewart in a clear and satisfactory manner. The decision settles an important question which greatly harrassed many of our farmers.

The clearness with which Mr. Gontrum presented his views of the law to Judge Stewart, entitles him to the highest credit as an intelligent member of
