Getting Better Milk Now--The State Board

l'hough only one or two arrests have been made under the new law to prevent the adultaration of milk, the State Board of Health has not been idle n this matter, but has been, and is doing a great deal of work. Dr. Chas. W. Chancellor, the Secre-tary of the Board, was talking about the matter vesterday. The law has only been enforced since une 1st, but the results from it have been very encouraging, both to the consumer and to the farmer who sends the milk to market. In the large majority of cases the adulteration of milk is done by he retail dealer, and more particularly by the men who sell it in wagons, delivering it at the house.— The farmers who send their product to market adulterate it very rarely. Of all cases that have come under notice, the percentage of adulteration by farmers was under twenty per cent., while by retailers it has been done by over thirty-two per cent The farmers, as a rule, have welcomed the milk inspector. They lost money before, as their customers would often blame them because the milk was thin, when the farmers knew that the milk they had sent to market was of the best quality The Dairy Association of Harford County, a short ime ago, sent a letter to Dr. Chancellor, thanking him for what had been done, and requesting that he would, if possible, have the milk that was sent to market by the members of the association examined carefully, and if anything was wrong with it, to notify them promptly and it would be quickly

remodied. The Doctor said that three or four millions of dollars' worth of milk was sold here annually, and, peretofore, about one-quarter of it was water.-That was lost by the farmer. A number of the little corner groceries that sell milk benefited by this watering transaction, for they were as bad as the delivery men. A number of them, when notified to stop watering their milk stopped selling it.

They evidently did not think the profit on pure
milk large enough to pay them for the trouble of handling it. The two commonest ways of adulteration are by watering it or by putting ice in it, or by skimming it. It is allowed by law to sell skim milk, but the dealer is compelled to label it conpicuously and not sell it for pure milk. If he does, e is just as liable to prosecution as the man who believes in the virtue of a good deal of water in his milk can. When an offender is caught, and the case is proven against him, he is warned that a epetition of the offense will subject him to a fine. If the warning is unheeded he is sometimes warned again. If that isn't sufficient he is arrested, and a jury or a magistrate settles the case. Dr. Chancellor said that he did not know whether there was any connection between infant mortali-ty and milk inspection, but he had noticed that since the law had been enforced the mortality among infants had been much smaller. In Boston and New York it had been shown that the labors of

the Board of Health in preventing adulteration of milk had been rewarded by a large decrease in the death rate of babies .- American of 23d inst.
