How to Preserve Milk Eighteen Months .-Provide bottles, which must be perfectly clean, sweet and dry; draw the milk from the cow into the bottles, and, as they are filled, immediately cork them well up, and fasten the corks securely with pack thread or wire. Then spread a little straw in the bottom of a boiler, on which place the bottles with straw between them until the boiler contains a sufficient quantity. Fill it up with cold water; heat the water, and as soon as it begins to boil draw the fire and let the whole gradually cool. When quite cold take out the bottles and pack them in sawdust in hampers and stow them in the coolest part of the house. Milk preserved in this manner and allowed to remain even eighteen months in the bottles, will be as sweet as when first milked from

Pro Forms Decree as to the Stansburg Wills.—On the 17th inst. ex-Indea Vallett and Ma Wills.—On the 17th inst. ex-Judge Yellott and Mr. W. Frank Mitchell, as counsel for Mrs. Eudocia Stansbury, filed a bill in the Circuit Court for Baltimore County asking for the construction of a clause in the will of Thomas Stansbury, deceased. The case was docketed under the title of Endocia Stansbury, widow, plaintiff, vs. John Hubner, Joseph M. Cone, Eben B. Hunting and Frederick Rice, de-The bill then states that Thomas Stansbury, by his will dated November, 1816, left to his grandson, Thomas Stansbury, the husband of the plaintiff and the "heirs of his body so long as they hold and till the same." certain lands in Baitimore county, in-cluding the parcel of land sold by Mrs. Eudocia Stansbury to the defendants, Hubner and others.— The devise was as follows: "I give and bequeath to Deborah Stansbury and Anna Powell, my daughters, all that tract of land whereon I now live called Daniel's Gift,' together with 'Carr's Lot' and 'Tracy's Park,' during their natural life, and at their decease the then tracts of land above mentioned I will and give to my grandson, Thomas

Stansbury, son of my son John, excepting the part hereafter bequeathed to him and the heirs of his body so long as they hold and till the same. Should he die without heirs of his body, my will and desire is that my grandson, Thomas Taylor, should have it, him, his heirs forever; and if Thomas should die without an heir then the aforementioned land to fall unto my grandson, James Taylor, to him, his helrs and assigns forever." On August 14th, 1817, said Deborah Stansbury and John Powell and Ann Powell, his wife, and Thomas Stansbury, son of John, executed and delivered to a certain Elizabeth Edwards a deed in fee of all the land which was devised as aforesaid to the said granters by the will of Thomas Stansbury, mentioned in the preceding paragraph; and the same land was on the same day conveyed by the party named to Deborah Stansbury and Ann Powell for life, with remainder to Thomas Stansbury; that the said Ann Powell and Deborah

Stansbury are dead; that Thomas Stansbury, the husband of the plaintiff, died in 1857 leaving an heir who also died; that Thomas Stansbury by a will of date March 31st, 1856, left all his property to his widow, Eudocia Stansbury, and she has held possession ever since. On June 16th, 1864, Eudocia Stansbury made a mortgage upon the above lands; that on May 28th, 1890, the plaintiff contracted in writing to sell to John Hubner, Joseph M. Cone, Eben B. Hunting and Frederick Rice in fee, free from incumbrances, at and for the sum of \$150 per acre the lot of land being part of the land devised as set forth by the wills of Thomas Stansbury, the elder, and Thomas Stansbury, the younger, situate in Baltimore county. Doubts have arisen as to the true operation and effect of words "so long as they hold and till the same," used in the will of Thomas Stansbury, the elder, in the devisee of the lands in question to his grandson, Thomas Stansbury, the younger, under whom the plaintiff claims title, and this case is brought for the purpose of procuring a judicial construction thereof. And if the Court shall be of the opinion that the plaintiff claiming title in the manner herein set forth owns and can convey a fee simple title in and to the said land. then the defendants are ready and willing as soon as the plaintiff has paid off and procured to be re-leased the mortgage given. But if the Court shall be of the opinion that the plaintiff claiming title to the lands in question in the manner herein set forth cannot convey the same by a clear fee simple title to the defendants, then the plaintiff is willing that a decree be passed in this case dismissing her bill and releasing the defendants from their said contract of purchase of the lands. Copies of the wills of Thomas Stansbury, Sr. and r., were filed in the case. The decree passed by Judges Fowler and Burke in he case is as follows:

Trestele on the York Radd Care.—The Elder-son Bones.—On Sunday last, 14th inst.; all the dam on the York Road running south of Waverly having been provided with the Slawson boxes, the conductors were dropped and the drivers were put to a great deal of trouble by people refusing to pu their money in the boxes. As soon as it became generally known on bunday that the conductors had been dropped, groups of excited men gathered at different points along the road and denounced the Company in strong terms. An ex-member of the Legislature declared that he would not deposit his fare in the box, but would retain the fare until a duly authorized collector of the Company came for it. "They can't compel me to put my fare in the box," said he, "and the driver would not dare to eject me if I offered him the fare and it is

receive the fare."

About fifteen men are out of employment on account of the change, and many of their friends helped to keep alive the fire of discontent, though nothing rash was advised, in speaking of the mat-ter, one citizen, who has used the York Yoad cars for a number of years, said: "We do not object to the Slawson box because we have to deposit our fares in it, nor because we have to go to the driver to get change; we do not object to pulling the bellrope when we want the car to stop, but we do ob-object to the taking away of the protection which we believe we are entitled to from the Company, and this protection is denied us by the removal conductors. Persons ride on the York Road cars between Waverly and North Avenue every day who are inclined to create a disturbance and the conduc-tors had their hands full sometimes in keeping drunkards and other objectionable and boisterous persons from boarding the cars. Nearly every night, and especially on Saturday nights, these riotously inclined individuals board the cars, and unless there is a conductor to look after them, the passengers, especially ladies, are in danger. We want the conductors for protection and not so much for convenience. The York Road is practically without police protection, and from the toll-gates at Waverly to North Avenue, it is a rare occurrence to

meet a policeman.
The cars running between Waverly and Govanstown are still provided with conductors, but no car between Govanstown and Towson is so provided nor have there been any for several years past. On the part of the Managers of the York Road Ruilway Company it was stated that affairs were resuming their normal condition, and that on Tuesday last all the troubles had subsided. All who boarded the cars—men, women and children paid their fares. Mr. Nelson Perin, the President of the Union Line, in company with J. W. Patterson, the Superintendent, rode over the entire line, and state that they saw no trouble or refusal of passengers to ploce their fares in the box. A reporter who went over the entire line from Baltimore to Towson saw no trouble whatever. At Waverly stables the city cars connect with the cars for Towson.-Philip Warfield, the veteran conductor of the Towson car, and James Clark, driver, also said there was no trouble. The fare from Pratt street terminus to the three-mile hill is now five cents: if used to be twenty cents. The fare from the same point to Towson via the city was thirty cents; it is
