WORK ON THE BELT RAILROAD.

The work on the Belt Railroad will be considerably interfered with by owners of property with whom the Company have been unable to agree, by the issuing of injunction, or by the summoning of a condemnation jury by the Sheriff of the city. A little common sense, however, will avoid much trouble and expense, and public sentiment will have considerable weight when matters are brought to an issue. A work of the importance and magnitude of the Belt line cannot be stopped by the arbitrary action or unreasonable demands of a few persons. Neither will the law allow a person's property to be taken without just compensation. The Belt Company has at all times been liberal where it has desired property, and is willing to pay for what it receives. As to injury to property through which the road passes, much of the injury is imaginary. A person is rarely found now, who, having made opposition to a railroad passing through or over his land, would be willing to see it taken up after it is once put down. It is perfectly natural for people to get out of corporations all they can, and it sometimes occurs that inadequate remuneration is the result and the corporation does the citizen an injury. The law, however, remedies such matters.

A CLERGYMAN FOR CONGRESS.

The Republicans of the Third Congressional District of Maryland (comprised within the first nine wards of Baltimore city) have nominated the Rev. Royal H. Pullman, a talented Universalist divine, as their candidate for Congress in opposition to the Hon. Harry Welles Rusk, the Democratic candidate. Mr. Pullman was nominated whilst he was away upon vacation. He says that he expects he will be formally notified of his nomination when he will accept, and when he gets upon the canvas he will endeavor to show that "the best American politics is religion in harness," whatever that may mean. At all events, the Rev. Pullman will need "a strong pull, a long pull, and a pull all together," in order to pull himself into the seat now held by Mr. Rusk, and there is no doubt he will have a regular wool-pulling affair, and will then recognize that it will take a stronger pull than he can give to succeed. THE B. & O. AND BUFFALO. A dispatch from Pittsburg dated 21st inst. states that the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad is going into Buffalo and Rochester. The road has been trying to tap these places for years and has at last succeeded. It will have a line from Pittsburg to Buffalo thirty miles shorter than the Allegheny Valley, which is now the most direct route from Pittsburg to the head of Lake Erie. The new route will be by the Pittsburg and Western from Allegheny to Butler, thence by the Allegheny and Shenango to Mercer, then to Franklin, where it joins the Western New York and Pennsylvania. The total length of the new line is 239 miles, or 30

Democrats in the House prevented the Republicans from acting upon the contested election case of Langston (negro) against Venable, of Virginia, by absenting themselves from the floor of the House so as to cause no quorum to be in the House. Reed having decided that 166 was a quorum, a big hunt was instituted to bring the absent Republicans into the House. Those members out of Washington were tele graphed for and implored to come into the House. The journals of Friday 19th, Saturday 20th and Monday 22d remained unapproved on account of the want of a quorum. But one Democrat, Mr. O'Ferrall, of Virginia, remained in his seat and by the little parliamentry power left him by Reed used it so as to prevent the journals being approved before any further business could be transacted, except to adjourn for the day. On two days the Republicans sent for a photographer who took a view of the empty benches on the Democratic side of the House, with the one single member, Mr. O'Ferrall. WRECK ON THE READING RAILROAD.

Above Shoemakerville, about 15 miles above Reading, there is a curve where the railroad about eighteen to twenty feet higher than the Schuylkill river. Here, shortly before six o'clock, a freight train ran into a coal train throwing several cars in the latter on the op posite track, and before the train hands had time to go back to warn any approaching train of the danger, the Pottsville express came around the curve and ran into the wrecked coal cars on the track. The engine went down the embankment into the river followed by the entire train with its human freight. The scene was one of great horror and can be bet ter imagined than described. The cries of the imprisoned passengers were heartrending. It was a scene never to be forgotten by those who participated and survived. Some of the passengers managed to crawl out of their prison, and arouse the neighborhood.

DISBARRED FROM PRACTICE.

On Saturday 21st the Supreme Bench of Bal timore City, all the Judges being present passed an order striking from the roll of attorneys the name of John H. Handy for misanpropriation of the trust funds of O. W. Miller & Co., oyster packers, Baltimore. When Mr. Handy received the trust he gave bond in the sum of \$30,000 with Wm. S. Taylor and T. Kell Bradford as sureties. It is stated that the amount of the trust is about \$10,000. Mr. Handy having failed to account for \$3,959.28 the Court summoned him to show cause why his name should not be stricken from the roll of attorneys. Mr. Handy, through his counsel, Messrs. Albert Ritchie, Isidor Rayner and John F. Williams, admitted the misappropriation of the trust funds, but stated that if allowed to continue practice he could pay it and make a living for himself and family. Some weeks since Mr. Handy left the city and his whereabouts are not known, though it is said he has gone to the West. The Supreme Bench, however, struck his name from the roll. The order

By an agreement of counsel the hearing on the petition filed a few days ago and set down for argument on the 25th of September was also held. The petition was filed in behalf of the bondholders of 1844, and asks the Court to suspend the sale of the Canal, to allow the bondholders of 1844 to take charge and to repair it and operate it as a waterway, and to appropriate the tolls and revenues to the payment of the bonds of 1844. The petitioners also ask the privilege of buying the bonds of 1878, that they may be subrogated to all the rights of the bondholders of 1878. They also ask that the receivers surrender to them all the Canal property so that they may operate it. The attorneys for the bondholders of 1844 and for the majority bondholders of 1878 asked quorum, 166, when he counted it, and then | that the petition be granted, while the counsel for the State, the Canal Company and the minority bondholders of 1878 oppose the grant-

It costs the Sovereign Grand Lodge an average of about \$35,000 for every meeting. This large sum should certainly be saved to the Order, and the assessments upon the Grand Lodges and Grand Encampments correspondingly reduced. It cost the Grand Lodge \$50,000 to hold its session at Denver, Colorado, in 1887, and \$70,000 to hold its session at Los Angeles, California, in 1888, a difference of \$15,000 for 1897 and of about \$25,000 for 1888. If the Grand Lodge would assemble once every two years and go diligently to work it could finish its session in one week, and possibly not more than ten days .-There should also be but one representative from each grand body. This would make the body more easily wielded, and only half as expensive as it now is.
