CONGRESS ADJOURNS. Congress finally adjourned on Thursday, 2d inst., and Senators and Representatives at once made preparation to leave for their homes; in fact, many of them left several days since,

In 1851 he was elected Clerk of the Circuit Court for Somerset County, a position which he held uninterruptedly until 1870. In that year he was nominated by the Democrats for State Comptroller and was elected. He served as Comptroller for four terms, retiring in January 1878, and immediately being chosen to the position as State Tax Commissioner, which was created at the legislative session of 1879. He

NABROW ESCAPE OF GEN. JUBAL A. MARLY.

On Monday 30th instant two buildings in Lynchburg, Va. which had been partially destroyed by fire suddenly collapsed, without a moment's warning, and a number of persons on the sidewalk narrowly escaped injury from the falling walls. Gen. Jubal A. Early and his body servant, a young mulatto, were up in the former's old room in the second story of one of the buildings and were carried down and buried under the ruins. The voice of the eld General was heard coming from the depths of the heap, and after some work the upper part of his person was brought to view, and it was found that he was not seriously hurt and that no bones were broken. His lower limbs however, were so wedged in by bricks and timbers that it was some time before he could be extricated, although the rescuers worked with a will. His escape was indeed miraculous. He was saved from death by the timbers of the upper flooring which in falling lodged with one edge against the adjoining wall and rested in an inclined position. If he had fallen a foot or two on the other side of the spot where he lay he would have been mashed into a jelly. When he was taken out and brought up to the street the crowd gave a tremendous cheer, a "rebel yell." and some of the "Old Confeds," cried out exultuntly, "He can't be killed?' His face wore a ghastly look, both from natural pallor as d from s coating of plaster and mortar dust it had received in the collapse, and a thin stream of blood trickling down from a small wound in his temple, through his flowing gray beard added a tragic effect. When he reached the street and stood on his feet the crowd gave another great cheer. Turning and calmly surveying what came so near being his tomb. he remarked: "The whole darn thing seems to have tumbled in." In a half-hour, after taking a little stimulant, he was himself again, suffering only from a little soreness and the


