THE COMING MASONIC FAIR. The approaching Masonic Fair, which will commence at the Fifth Regiment Armory on the 7th of October, will quite likely equal that held at Maryland Institute at the close of our civil war, when over one hundred thousand dollars were raised for the suffering people of the South. The Baltimore American of the 24th thus describes the preparations that are now

being made: "The fair will last one month, and it in no way disparages other great fairs Baltimore has had in the past to say that this one will surpass anything of the kind ever seen here.-Everything is being planned on a colossal scale, and in magnificence of conception and arrangement it will be hard to rival. A large force is daily at work on the interior of the Armory and on the annex which has been erected on the Garden street side. A scene of bewildering splendor will be the hanging garden or Oriental booth, just at the entrance of the second story. This is being prepared by Mr. Wm. J. O'Brien, whose work at the May fete at the Academy of Music was the object of so much admiration. It is 55 feet in diameter, and will be used by Messrs. Martin Gillet & Co., and fitted up with all sorts of Oriental curiosities and handsome wars. The Company's rooms on the left will be used as Turkish apartments. where coffee, cigars and cigarettes will be sold. and the large officers' rooms on the right will be converted into an art gallery, with some of the finest pictures from the best collections of New York and other cities.

The Veteran Corps room will be used as the headquarters of Grand Master Shryock and the Executive Committee. The Great Southern Band will be in the north gallery every night. Different cutertainments will be provided every night. The special entertainment will be a Turkish dance by a class of young ladies trained by Prof. Hazazer. There will be a drill by the Washington Light Infantry one night, and St. John's Commandery will give a Templar drill on Templar day. The second Saturday afternoon will be baby day, and all the babics present under two years of age will be

Grand Master Shryock. The fair will be opened with a parade by the Masonic fraternities and Knights Templar, Shryock and his officers from the Masonic Temple to the Fifth Regiment Armory, and the hours each day will be from twelve noon to ten at night. The annex on the Garden street front covers 8,000 square feet, and there will be one of the best appointed restaurants that human ingenuity can devise. This will be in charge of Harris, the well-known cateror, and the charges will be regulated entirely by what is desired. There will be no ice cream or confectionery there, but they will be in another part of the building, especially reserved for them. A large room in the rear of the building covers 3,000 square feet, and is to be used as a ladies' dressing room. There will be a private entrance on the Garden street side for the lady workers of the fair. Three additional stairways have been erected, and the building can be cleared in five minutes, if necessary.-The reading room will be used for booths by Oriental and Kedion Lodges. The booth of Oriental Lodge will represent a Turkish mosque. The electric light display of the

The squad drill room, on the left of the main entrance, will be occupied by the Grand Lodge Table, Mrs. John K. Cowen, President. This entrance, will be occupied by the Grand Lodge room will be decorated in purple, white and gold, the Grand Lodge colors. Upon entering the hall the visitor first sees the grotto. This will be occupied by a number of young ladies costumed to represent different kinds of flowers. It will be entirely original in design and novel in all its appointments. There will be thirty booths, and each one will be an original design, designating the particular Lodge to which it belongs. The booth of Mystic Circle Lodge will be in the form of a mystic circle; Doric Lodge, an ancient temple of Doric architecture; Lafayette Lodge will have a representation of the Eiffel Tower, and the booth will be decorated with the French colors; Monumental Lodge will have a representation of the Battle Monument; Concordia Lodge will have a beautiful representation of harmony and music; Waverly Lodge will have a representation of Waverly Castle; Warren Lodge, the Bunker Hill Monument; Pythagoras Lodge, an ancient Egyptian temple: Germania Lodge,

a colossal figure of Germania; Arcana Lodge, an Egyptian booth. Encircling the grotto will be a series of booths of Oriental design. The ladies in these booths will wear Turkish costumes, and the Lodges occupying them will be adherence, Mt. Vernon, Ben Franklin, Sincerity, Union, Washington and J. H. B. Latrobe. The annex will be completed this week, and the hanging garden is nearing completion. Handsome donations are coming in from Masonic Lodges all over the country, from business firms and individuals. Nearly every State in the Union will be represented at the fair. It is expected that there will be an attendance during the month it lasts of fully one hundred thousand people. THE AUSTRALIAN BALLOT LAW. Instructions to Voters in Preparing and Casting Their Ballots.

In accordance with Australian Ballot Law. passed at the session of the Legislature last winter, Hon. E. W. LeCompte. Secretary of State, has issued the following instructions to voters, how to prepare and cast their ballots. These instructions are printed upon cards and will be posted at each polling place in the State where the act operates. The counties of Balmore, Carroll, Garrett, Talbot, Kent, Caroline, Dorchester, Montgomery and Harford are exempted from the operations of the act. The nstructions are as follows:

1. Any person desiring to vote must enter the voting-room and give his name, and residence, if requested, to one of the ballot clerks. If his name is found upon the list of registered voters he must enter the space inside the rail. A ballot clerk shall hen give him one ticket, to be marked with initials of the clerk before being given to the voter. 2. After receiving the ballot the voter must re-tire alone to one of the voting compartments and prepare his ballot by marking in the margin a cross-mark (X) opposite the name or emblem of a party, as a vote for all the group of candidates of that party whose names he shall not erase; or make such cross-mark (X) opposite the name of the candidate, or candidates, of his choice for each office to be filed in a blank space provided, and make a cross-mark (X) opposite thereto. If the election be upon a question submitted to the vote of the people, the voter shall indicate his choice by making n the margin a cross-mark (X) opposite the answer or vote he desires to give. A stamp, with a cross-mark (X) thereon, will be provided for the use of preparing his official ballot, but the sample ballot used must not be of the color or quality of paper of the official ballot, and the voter must make and

the voter. In making his ballot a voter can use or copy any unofficial sample ballot to assist him in deposit his ballot without undue delay. Before leaving the compartment the voter must fold his ballot without displaying the X marks, or in the same way as when given him; he shall then hand the folded ballot to the Judges of Election. As soon as his vote is taken he must leave the pollingroom, and cannot again enter the enclosed space. 3. A voter must not go into any compartment occupied by another, or overlook or converse with any other while engaged in a compartment, nor can he occupy one for more than five minutes if others are waiting.
4. No person shall take or remove any ballot from the polling place before the close of the polls. If a voter spoils a ballot he may obtain others from the Ballot Clerks, one at a time, not exceeding three in all, upon returning each spoiled one.

5. A voter who is blind, or one who cannot read, or who from physical disability is unable to mark his ballot, may apply to the two Ballot Clerks to assist him in marking the same. A voter of foreign birth who cannot speak English is allowed to bring to the rail one person who can speak English to assist the voter in properly stating and spelling his name and in establishing his residence, and to ald in correctly understanding questions. 6. A voter must not mark more names than there are persons to be elected; if he does, the ballot will not be counted. 8. Any voter who shall allow his ballot to be seen, with an apparent intention of letting it be known how he is to vote, or who places any distinguishing mark thereon, or any person who decorated with a commemorative medal by shall attempt to interfere with any voter inside the enclosed space, shall be fined not less than 85 or more than \$100.

Glass ballot-boxes will be used. All ballots to be used at the election will be printed and distributed Maryland Commandery escorting Grand Master | at public expense, each ballot to contain names of all the candidates who have been duly nominated The names of candidates nominated by each political party shall be grouped together in parallel columns on the ballot and headed by the name of the political party by which the candidates comprising the group were placed in nomination.-When a party emblem or device has been added i shall be printed to the left or above the name of the party preceding the party group. There shall be left at the end of the list of candidates for each diferent office as many blank spaces as there are of ficers to be voted for, in which the voter may insert in writing or otherwise the name of any person not printed on the ballot for whom he may desire to vote as a candidate for such office. The Secretary of State is required to prepare and ransmit to the Supervisors of Election, at least hirty days before the first election, sample printed forms of ballots, and also to transmit the cards of instruction mentioned in the foregoing. A record of the number of ballots printed and furnished for each polling place shall be kept and preserved by the Supervisors of Election, and the records shall be retained for six months. In order to assist voters, the law requires that, at least four days prior to the day of election, there shall be conspicuously posted in one or more public places in each pre cinct sample copies of the ballots to be used.
