GERMAN DAY.

Our German fellow citizens of Baltimore celebrated "German Day" Monday, 6th inst. The day was most unpropitious, but it did not dampen their ardor, though the rain descended pretty much all day. Through the day the exercises took place indoors, where unbounded German sentiment prevailed. It was a happy day, as only Germans know how to produce music, which greatly interfered with a proper celebration. Notwithstanding there was the most unbounded enthusiasm, and with the many bands of music in the line and the general jollity, the clouds retained and permitted the parade to go over the river. Mayor Davidson reviewed the parade from the City Hall, and was honored by the whole line as it marched by. Had the weather been better and the streets drier, it would have been a demonstration greatly exceeded. As it was all the streets were greatly crowded and locomotion was difficult. Similar demonstrations were held all over the United States, and there was general enjoyment.

DUPONT POWDER MILLS EXPLODE.

The Dupont Powder Mills, on the Brandywine River, about 4 miles from Wilmington, Delaware, exploded with terrific force on Tuesday, 7th inst. The explosion was attended by about thirty. The bodies of several of the men employed in the works were blown to atoms, so that but small portions of the remains were found. Others were horribly mutilated. Six different miles were destroyed. They were situated from 4 to 7 miles from Wilmington along the Brandywine. It is said to have been caused by the workmen sealing a can of powder with a soldering iron that was too hot. One mill after another exploded until six mills were in ruins. The shock was distinctly felt in Wilmington, where windows were broken. The house of many employees near the mill utterly destroyed, and many of the inmates injured by falling timbers and walls. It is stated that the explosion was also felt in certain parts of Philadelphia and the surrounding country for many miles. About fifty families are rendered homeless. The loss to the Messrs. Dupont will be \$500,000. It is estimated that the explosion cost the lives of 100 men. The Dupont Company look well after the widows and children of the men who were killed by explosions while in their employ. The men know it is dangerous but take the risks as a pay is good.

THE GRAND MASONIC FAIR.

The Grand Masonic Fair, for which preparations have been going on among the ladies and Masons of Baltimore for the past year or more, was formally opened at the Fifth Regiment Armory on Tuesday night, 7th inst. Maryland Commandery, Knights Templar, escorted Grand Master Shroyck, his officers, the Grand Com-mandery, the Grand High Priest, and a large number of high dignitaries of the fraternity, from the Masonic Temple to the Fair, where Mr. John M. Carter, Chairman of the Executive Committee, in a neat address introduced the Grand Master, who formally opened the Fair by the delivery of a short address. The Armory is a perfect work of beauty, far surpassing anything of the kind ever seen in Baltimore. It is a most magnificent structure, and the Canal which is to be repaired, every man worth a visit even if one does not wish to purchase anything. We trust all our citizens, as they will pass the Fair a visit. There are sure to pass a pleasant hour or two. There are concerts every night.

A BUNCH IN OUR DITCH.

Judge Alvey on the 29th ult. rendered a decision in the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal case, in accordance with the application of the bondholders of 1844 to take charge of the Canal, pay the bondholders as paying water-way. They are also to make a cash deposit in Court of \$100,000 to pay for legal expenses up to present date, and also a bond for \$600,000 that the Canal will be repaired and ready for business by the 1st of May, 1891. The Court addressed to its former deponent John D. Baker, Robert Bridges and Richard D. Johnson to sell the Canal, which is to be operative only after it has been demonstrated that the Canal cannot be operated as a paying investment. Mr. H. K. O'Leary, agent for the Canal, has the honor of 1844 was put up the necessary funds and repair the Canal, and pay the bondholders of 1878, the amount of which (\$800,000) has now accumulated to \$600,000.

FIFTH DISTRICT CANALS.

The Democrats of Anne Arundel county opened the canvass in the Fifth Congressional District on Tuesday night, 7th inst. in Annapolis, by holding a routing meeting in the Opera House, it being too inclement to hold the meeting on the outside where it was first intended to hold it. The meeting was addressed by ex-Governor Robert M. McLean, Congressman Hooker and Mr. Compton. The Democracy of Anne Arundel is a unit, and will give a more than usual majority on the day of election.

I. O. O. F.

At the special session of the Grand Lodge of Maryland, I. O. O. F., held on Monday night 6th inst., the lot of ground owned by the late Prof. N. R. Smith, 60 by 150 feet, at the corner of Saratoga and Cathedral streets, was selected as the spot upon which to erect the new Hall. The price was \$45,000 cash. It is a fine location and is universally approved. A handsome commodious and convenient Hall will be built.

CITY REGISTRATION.

The registration in Baltimore city has been completed and there are 89,140, about 17,000 less than it is claimed are entitled to vote. There are 74,922 white voters and 11,388 colored. A recent police census estimates that there are 103,000 persons in the city.

WATER WANTED!

Some of the beauties of an annexation of Baltimore county's "Belt" are constantly cropping out. The public recollects well the glowing colors with which our esteemed neighbor the Sun painted the magnificent water which was immediately to be scattered all over the Belt. How free to be extinguished with it, etc., etc. But about all the water the citizens of nearly all the Belt receive now is that which falls from the clouds, and that is left to lie in puddles in the public roads and never taken up until it percolates through the earth or is evaporated by the sun which happens to alight on it. The citizens of Waverly this week sent a committee which called upon Mayor Davidson to see if water could not be gotten for that rapidly growing section. The Mayor was courteous and pleasant to them as he is to everybody, but he could afford them no relief. So he advised them to the Water Board, and, singly, and as applicants for water privileges. Then the Water Board directs their estate Chief Engineer, Robert K. Martin, to look into the matter. He soon informs these suffering citizens that if a certain number of persons want water and the profits which the Water Department receives for the water service will pay not less than 2 per cent. on the cost of laying pipes, he will the Water Board to lay out the Board that the pipes be laid. If there are not the requisite number of water consumers to pay such costs, Col. Martin with his blandness of smile will inform them that the Water Board would gladly make the improvement but it will not pay. This pay matter was not represented to the people of the Belt when they were excited to vote themselves in the city and participate in all the then promised splendid advantages. It was outrageous, shameful, jiggery, and the city citizens know it. They thus pulled the wool over the eyes of the confiding Beltites, and now suffer in consequence. There is no doubt the people of Waverly ought to have water, and they ought to pay for it. To drink water from the springs and wells that they now have there, is drinking into the system typhoid and other fevers and diseases, and that can scarcely be avoided, as the filth and of all of so large a population is sure to percolate into their springs and wells.

To be sure the Belt has the gaily caparisoned "water main" and while it pays no cost, it is estimated that fully 10,000 persons participated in it.
