Justice Samuel F. Miller, of the Supreme Court of the United States, who was stricken with paralysis on Friday afternoon last 10th inst. whilst walking from the Capital to his home, died at 10.52 o'clock on the night of the 13th inst. He had been gradually sinking since the night of the attack. He was a native of Kentucky, but was appointed to the Supreme Court from Iowa, by President Lincoln, in 1862, and was therefore upon the Bench 28 years continously. He was regarded as one of the ablest Justices of the Court. His body was taken to Keckuk, Iowa, for interment.
