It is on the people who are compelled by a lack of funds to practice the utmost economy in all articles of dress that the Republican Tariff Tax bears hardest. The tax on dress goods have been raised to an extent not thought of even in war times. Part wool goods costing 20 cents a yard were advanced in price by the old tariff to 32 cents, but the McKinley tariff puts them up to 45 cents. That will bear hard on poor men's wives and daughters. The duty on the class of goods they buy is advanced from 61 per cent. to 125 per cent. The rich, however, will fare better. Dress goods, all wool, formerly paying 90 per cent. duties will now pay 117 per cent. A still finer class of goods that formerly paid 65 per cent. will now pay but 84. The discrimination is always in favor of those who can afford to buy costly goods. In hoisery the same rule applies. Cotton hose costing abroad 80 cents a dozen formerly paid a 40-per cent. duty, but now pays 92½ per cent., while hose costing \$5 a dozen formerly 40 per cent., and now pays 60 per cent. only. For example, cotton stockings that under the old tariff cost \$2.10 a dozen now, under the McKinley tariff, cost \$2.52.--Handkerchiefs, velvets, napkins, crash, linen and pearl buttons are all advanced in price by the new law. Where is the money to come from to pay the extra figures? Mr. McKinley ought to have given everybody an appropria-

of the cost of labor, not the reduction of the profits of the manufacturer in the trust. ex-There can be no kind of doubt that the effect of the McKinley bill has been to increase the cost of goods very greatly and suddenly.--We have had indubitable evidence of it during the past week by the letters we have seen in the hands of business men that are notifications from the wholesale firms with which they deal. Not only this, but we know from shoppers who are posted as to retail prices, that there has been a sudden leap in the cost of the very goods whose prices the shoppers ascertained a week or ten days ago. No records, however. show that wages have been increased in any direction during this time. This state of affairs has made the individual protectionists so angry that they can not argue the question of free trade and protection. They have lost their tempers. Wherever you see a boiling, rearing fellow, who has got beyond the stage of argument, and who is a protectionist because he is, and he don't care who knows it. Those persons in trade or otherwise who

have laid in heavy stocks, or who have full and plenty goods for personal use, are made suddenly richer because the value of the same articles now are worth much more than when the McKinley bill was not a law. The poor levil who-needs a shirt for the coming winter s rendered poorer by the increase. A merchant with \$50,000 stock of goods laid in three months ago finds that by his ability to levy an increase of but ten per cent. on the goods he has, the government has made him a present of \$5,000. The richer he is,—the more goods he has laid in—the more has the government given him. In Baltimore alone are firms with stock valued at \$300,000; by a ten per cent. increase on this the firm gets a present of \$39,000, a fortune in itself. facturer. The mule is stronger than the man. Though the mule is much stronger than the man, the man manages the mule for his own purposes .-He puts a bridle on him, and a saddle, and rides on his back. He puts harness, made of leather, on the mule, and by speaking to him and giving him plenly of licks, induces him to walk and pull a wagon, while the man gets into the wagon and rides. The mule does much hard work, but all the money gained by the mule's work the man appropriates to himself. The mule lives roughly, is fed in a trough and sleeps on the ground on a little straw. The man eats at a table and sleeps in a warm bed. The mule is a useful animal to the man.

The farmer is stronger than the manufacturer. Though the farmer is much stronger than the manufacturer, the manufacturer manages him for his own purpose. He puts's bridle, called loyalty to party, in his mouth, and on the saddle on his back and rides him where he wills. He puts harness made of tariff on the farmer, and by making speeches to him and giving him plenty of taffy induces him to walk and draw a fine carriage called protection, while the manufacturer gets in the carriage and rides at his ease. The farmer does much hard work, but all the money gained by the farmer's work the manufacturer appropriates to himself. The farmer has become poor and lives roughly on a mortgaged farm, he eats plain food from delf and tinplate and rejoices to pay a high duty on them. The manufacturer has become wealthy and eats from fine china and silver-plate and sleeps on a downy bed. The farmer is very useful to the manufacturer. Moral: Those who do not use their brains for themselves must use their muscles for some one else.—Arkansas City Journal.

THE NEW TARIFF.

The tariff bill has raised the price of pretty

much everything the farmers need to buy .-But the framers of the bill are endeavoring to make the farmer believe that he will receive compensation in the raising of the price of the things he has to sell. If he does believe this, it will no longer be possible to pretend that he is an intelligent person. It may be supposed that the farmers who raise the products that constitute the great staples of our agriculture and the chief of cur exports are aware that the prices of those things cannot be raised by any act of Congress. Breadstuffs, pork and "hog products," and beef are sold at price fixed, not in the markets of this counry alone, but in the markets of the world .-There is no possibility of a Wheat Trust or a Corn Trust or a Pork Trust which shall be enabled by the tariff to do what it has over and over been proved that many of the Trusts especially favored by tariff do, and that is to charge their fellow-citizens more for their goods than they charge foreigners who, not being protected by our tariff, get the benefit of prices fixed by competition. Legislation, the tariff legislation, however, may work to lower the price of these things if it induces foreign governments to retaliate upon us and to shut their markets against our agricultural pro- as the our pork has been excluded from France and Germany and our beef from Great Britain or on grounds of avowed and open retaliation.
