Suicide Near Catonsville .- On Monday after noon, 27th ult., the body of a man was found in Armitage's woods, near Catonsville. by Mr. W. A. Wilson and two boys, Paul Coskery and Richmond Spears, which proved to be the corps of Mr. John Scheldle, who had committed suicide by shooting himself with a gun. Justice Albert Smith, of Catonsville, was notified and held an inquest on the remains. The jury rendered a verdict of suicide. The deceased started out Monday morning to go gunning, and in the afternoon his body was found

seated against the trunk of a tree, the barrel of the gun grasped in his left hand. The right hand ap peared to have dropped to his side after it had pulled the trigger. The gun must have been overoaded, for over the head of the dead man the branches of the trees were torn and shattered by the shot after it passed through his head. By his side on the ground lay a piece of paper, on the back of which was scribbled in German: "John Scheidle, born March 12th, 1812, 79 years old. I will shoot myself dead." No reason can be assigned for the deed. Scheidle lived with his son, Henry Scheidle, and had a comfortable home. For nearly thirty years he lived at Catonsville, and during the winter he had charge of many of the country residences as overseer. Isaac, whose name had been stricken from the Registration Books of the 2d Election District appeared before his Honor, Judge Burke, on the 30th ult., on the following petition filed by Mr. Isaac in the case: WM M. ISAAC VS. HENRY B. FRYFOGLE, Register

John W. Shanklin, Esq., Clerk of the Circuit Court for Baltimore County: To the Hon, the Judges of the Circuit Court for Baltimore County: The petition of William M. Isaac respectfully represents, that he is a native of the State of Maryland and a resident therein all his life; that on or about B. Fryfogle, Register of Voters for the 2d Election District of Baltimore county, did, at his sitting as an injury which he has no means of having corrected save through the medium of an application to your Honorable Court. He therefore prays the Court to pass an order directing and requiring said the Register in striking the name of your petioner from said lists, the other is supposed to be a copy of entries on the registration book of said District. Mr. Fryfogle made answer that he had stricken the name from the list in the belief that Mr. Isaac had moved from the 2d into the 9th District. Mr. Isaac appeared in his own behalf and testified that he had a furnished dwelling in the 2d District. the house in Towson was advertised for sale and i sold he would undoubtedly move back into the Dis-

Mr. F. I. Duncan, the State's Attorney appeared as counsel for the Register of Voters and made but a short argument on the case, and Mr. Issac replied. Judge Burke in delivering his opinion said: "As the time for the reinstatement of the name on the books is so limited I cannot give that formal opinion in the case which I would like to, and so will decide it at once. The Court of Appeals in a recent decision has laid down an opinion which cannot be taken in the actual and physical sense but in all its intents. Mr. Isaac having been properly and lawfully registered in the 2d District in 1881, and having property in the District, and having an interest in the affairs of the District, and bearing his share of the public burden of taxation, and being interested in the welfare of the District, he certainly is to all intents and purposes resident of

the District, and that as he has always maintained his determination to retain his residence there, he certainly is entitled to remain upon the books of that District as a qualified registered voter, and the Court in accordance therewith passed an order reinstating Mr. Isaac's name upon the registration. Upon the decision of the Court Mr. Duncan, the State's Attorney consented also to have an order passed reinstating the name of Mr. J. Dickson O'Dell upon the books of the 2d District.
