VIRGINIA AND WEST VIRGINIA. The returns from Virginia and West Virginia confirm previous reports of a Democratic sweep in those States, both Congressional delegations being solidly Democratic. In the latter State the Democrats also secure a good working ma-DELAWARE.

Complete returns from Delaware show the election of Robert J. Reynolds, Democrat, for Governor, and Mr. Causey, Democrat, for Congress, by majorities of four and five hundred respectively.

PENNSYLVANIA. Pennsylvania elected ex-Gov. Robert Emory Pattison ever George Wallace Delamater, the Republican candidate for Governor, by about 16,000 majority. Chauncey F. Black and William II. Barclay, the other Democrats on the State ticket, were defeated. The Democrats elected eleven of the twenty-eight Congress

NORTH CAROLINA. In North Carolina there is a net gain for the Democratic ticket of 13,000. In the Fifth Congressionel district A. K. Williams, Democrat was elected over J. M. Brower. Republican. making a gain of one Congressman for the Democrats.

The Democrats gained increased majorities in the New Jersey Legislature. The Senate will stand 13 Democrats, 7 Republicans and 1 Independent Democrat: the Assembly, 43 Democrats and 17 Republicans. The Congressional delegation contains 2 Republicans and 5 Democrats, a Democratic gain of 1.

Missouri elected a solid Democratic delegation to Congress. The Democrats elected the entire city ticket in St. Louis, except the Recorder of Deeds.

WISCONSIN George W. Peck, the humorist, Democratic candidate for Governor of Wisconsin. was elected by a large majority. The Democrats will have a majority in the Legislature and gain two Congressmen. The Democrats opposed the Bennett compulsory State School Law, and the Republicans took the position that the law is good and must remain on the statute-books.

TENNESSEE. Tennessee elected the full Democratic State ticket by 25,000 to 30,000 majority. H. C. Snodgrass, Democrat, defeated H. Clay Evans, Republican, for Cougress in the Third District. making a Democratic gain of one Congressman. COLORADO. Colorado is still in doubt. Complete returns have not been received from a single county. The vote is close.
