Asking for Road Improvements.—Mr. W. R. Townsend and other residents of the 12th District, appeared before the County Commissioners on the 1th inst. and asked that the Board have Eastern Avenue from Canton to Rust's, 2 miles in length, which is the same The cath put in a condition by shelling the same. The esti-mated cost is \$2,000. Mr. Townsend asked that the money for the same be appropriated out of the road tax for 1891. One of the delegation said they would be willing to be taxed 10 cents extra as a road fund. Mr. Townsend said the people in the upper part of the 12th District would oppose the extra 10-cent tax. Mr. Magruder said its imposition could only be effected by petition at the time the levy is made.
