Electricity for Street Railway Travel.—That electricity will eventually supercede the present slow mode of street and suburban railway travel there is no doubt. The horse must give way to rapid transit on street railways as readily as he did the old omnibuses and stage coaches of sainted memory to our present street car. The North Avenue Railway Company of Baltimore city is now operating an overhead electric railway on North avenue from the corner of Division street westwardly to Tenth street. By a recent ordinance of the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore it was authorized to extend its tracks along North avenue eastwardly to McCulloh street, and it is now engaged in building this extension. It is also extending its tracks westwardly through "Walbrook," the property of the West Boundary Real Estate Company, which has recently passed into the hands of a number of enterprising and influential gentlemen. When both extensions have been completed, which will be within the next 60

days, it will own and have in operation about three miles of electric railroad passing through "Beech Hill" and "Walbrook," the most beautiful and prosperous portion of the recently annexed suburbs of Baltimore. The construction of the road is due to the enterprise and courage of the property-owners along its route. It has induced already the expenditure of large sums of money on its line. The North Avenue Railway Company is the first line to actually furnish rapid transit. The stockholders of this road have applied to the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore for permis-sion to extend their road from its present easternmost terminus, at the corner of North avenue and McCulloh street, to a terminus at the corner of Baltimore and North streets along the following route: Along North avenue eastwardly to North street. Along North street southwardly to Baltimore If proper authority is given by the Mayor and City Council the North Avenue Rallway Company will immediately build and equip a double track

overhead electric road along this route. From a point on North street between Eager and Chase streets to the corner of North street and Baltimore street the road will be elevated upon iron columns or arches, so as not to interfere with the tracks of the Northern Central Railroad or to impede traffic along the busy parts of North street.

The overhead wires will be carried by a single line of ornamental iron poles at intervals of one hundred and fifty feet, extending down between the two tracks. The current passing along the wires will not be o deadly character, but the wires will be absolutely protected by guard wires from contact with other

The cars will be commodious, cleanly and of attractive design, and will run at intervals of five minutes over the entire route

The elevated track on North street will be built upon iron columns, furnishing but little obstruction to light and air.
