The Catonsville Water Company Case,-udge Burke on the 4th inst, filed the following lon in the case :

The Catonsville Water Company, a body corporate Plaintiff, vs. Samuel D. Helfrich, Defendant.

The Catonsville Water Company was incorporated by an Act of the General Assembly of Maryland. passed at the January Session, 1886, Chapter 100. It was authorized by its charter to purchase, hold, lease, use and possess such land, water rights, powers and privileges, tenements, goods and chattels, as might be necessary for collecting streams of water, elevating, preserving, using and distributing the same as the means of abundantly supplying with pure water the public and private houses, streets, squares, laues and other places in the village of Catonsville, a prosperous and thickly-set-tled community in Baltimore county. It was also clothed with full power for the distribution of said water, and for carrying into effect the purpose set out in said act of incorporation. With the view of realizing the purpose of its creation, the Company purchased a tract of land containing about 8 acres. situated on the south side of the Baltimore and Fredericktown Turnpike Road, near the village of Catonsville, in Baltimore county. It erected large and expensive machinery, built a dam or reservoir, under the supervision of Robert K. Martin, Chief Engineer of the Baltimore City Water Works; laid over 10 miles of martin products. over 10 miles of water mains, and had at the time of the institution of this suit expended in the construction of the works nearly \$100,000. It had a complete establishment and equipment for supplying pure water to its consumers and was, as a matter of fact, then supplying nearly 1,600 people with water. It was farnishing water to public institu-tions as well as to private families. The defendant is the owner of land located en said turnpike. The larger portion of this land is situated north of said pike. Upon this portion is erected his awelling house, barn, and other outbuildings. He also ewns a small tract containing about 3% acres on the south side of said pike, upon which tract there is a number of trees which, in season, furnish good shade. The distance between these 3% acres of defendant's land and the plaintiff's dam and works is about one-half mile. In the intervening space is embraced the lands of Mr. Farnandis, Mr. Reich and Mr. Livezey. The plaintiff supply of water is drawn from these streams. Two of these cross the pike from the north and flow through the defendant's 8%-acre lot on the south of the pike. One of these streams (the larger of the two) flows along the extreme western or southwestern boundary of said lot. The

other (the smaller stream) crosses the southeastern or corner of said lot. There is also one other small spring branch or stream which runs along the south side of the turnpike from a spring near the Thistle Factory Company's Works and enters the smaller stream above mentioned at the point where it crosses the pike. The water of these streams flows into plaintiff's reservoirs, and is indispensable to the plaintiff in its business. The plaintiff has such arrangements that in times of rains the waters o the streams, when muddy or discolored, is not permitted to flow into the reservoirs of the plaintiff. but is emptied below the dam by means of waste pipes. The main point of contention in this cause is over the larger stream which flows along the western boundary of defendant's lot south of the pike into plaintiff's reservoir. The water of these streams when undisturbed is clear, pure, wholesome drinking water. The larger of these streams is from 5 to 8 feet wide, and the bottom thereof, except in two or three places on defendant's land, is composed of stone and gravel, and the water is clear fresh and swift running.
