McLane, President, has purchased a controlling interest in the Baltimore and Powhatan Railroad. They will at once take charge of the atter and operate it in connection with their Edmondson Avenue line. The Baltimore and Powhatan road extends from West Baltimore and Payson streets to Powhatan, Baltimore county, via the lourishing villages of Calverton, Highland Park, Wetheredsville and Franklintown, a distance of about seven miles. It is understood that the North Baltimore Railway Company intends at an early day to convert their new purchase into an electric line, and have already contracted with the Wenstrom Electric Company to

furnish the necessary power. The immense works of the latter, near the formerly famous Five Mills, are rapidly nearing completion, and it is expected that they will be ready to commence operations early next year. What! before we get it on the York Road! Suit Against the Jork Road (Now Union) Railway.—Thomas Ogle has brought suit against the President, Managers and Company of the Baltimore and Yorktown Turnpike road, claiming \$5,000 damages for injuries alleged to have been received by being forcibly ejected from one of the Company's cars. The plaintiff claims that November 15th last he entered one of the defendant's cars for the purpose of riding to Waverly. After he got on the car the driver, who also acted as conductor, asked him for his fare. The plaintiff said he had already placed his fare in the box or slide provided for the purpose, and refused to pay his fare again. The driver then, the bill charges, forcibly ejected him from the car, by which action he claims he

Wilkens Avenue Extension .- In the Baltimore Sun of the 9th reference was made to the importance of the extension of Wilkens Avenue, to which he Journal has referred for the past twenty years. There is no doubt the extension described would have the most beneficial effect upon property through which it would traverse, and a correspo ing good effect upon all contiguous property, making all the lands more valuable and thus considerably enlarging the taxable basis of the county.-The Sun says: "When the extension of Wilkens Avenue west from Gwynn's Falls was projected, in 1860, it was proposed that the Patapaco, at Orange Grove, on the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, should be its terminus. Circumstances prevented its completion fur-ther than the Rolling Road. Recently, at the house

of Mrs. Richard Norris, in Howard county, directly west of Orange Grove, a company assembled, which included H. G. Welty, Bridge Engineer and Surveyor of Frederick county, who suggested the extension of the avenue from a point on the property of Mr. C. Morton Stewart, directly south of the dwelling; thence through the property of the late Judge Glenn, then through the property of Mr. Richard Cromwell, Jr., then through the land of the Girl's Country Home, and thence for a short distance through the Glenn estate to a point on Hilton Avenue, near Orange Grove Station, and from the latter point on Hilton Avenue, by a gentle curve, to the top of a bluff a few hundred feet east of Orange Grove Station, from which bluff a bridge would be started. To this point there would be no grade over 8 feet to the 100, and most of the road would be straight. It is now proposed to lay out this road 60 feet wide and to put 20 feet in traveling order as soon as the funds are raised. The bridge will pass the tracks of the Baltimore and Ohio overhead, will be 18 feet wide and 60 feet high and about 600 feet long from the biuff on the Baltimore county side to a similar bluff on the Howard county side, and will be sup-ported by two piers, in addition to the abutments. The piers will be iron cylinders filed with concrete and the bridge plates will rest upon the concrete. On the Howard county side it will pass near the stream known as "The Cascades," requiring the strengthening the banks of the stream in several places, and passing on through the lands of Mrs. Norris, Mr. R. To this point the entire length of the road from the Rolling Road will be a little short of three It is then proposed by making a new road of less than a mile in length to connect with the entire system of county roads between the Frederick Turnpike and the Washington Turnpike, and proceeding westward to the north of Clarksville to connect with the county road leading to Triadelphia, in Montgomery county. The result of this improvement will, it is argued, give the counties of Montgomery, Howard and Baltimore a connection of the greatest value, far superior to that of the Washington Road, and hardly inferior to that of the Frederick Turnpike. It will brings the farms between Triadelphia and the Patapsco River from six miles to two miles nearer the city than at present, and it will open up on both sides of the river a country which is said to be unsurpassed in the neighborhood of any scaboard city for suburban development. The country through which it goes has everything to make it attractivewood, water, soil and landscape beauty, and above all, no malaria. It will, it is said, immensely increase the taxable basis. The expense of the bridge

A Question as to Taxes on Whiskey in Bond.
