OBITUARY. Arthur J. Hurley. Arthur J. Hurley, aged 87 years, eldest son of Michael and Catherine Hurley, of 784 Frederick Avenue, Baltimore city, formerly Baltimore county, died at the residence of his father in-law, Capt. J. Newton Fritts, on December, 5th inst. Mr. Hurley had been employed for a number of year. by the General Government, and was foreman of a gang of workmen on the Mussle Shoals Canal, on the Tennessee kiver, in Alabama About the latter part of October he was attacked with dysentery, which proved too stubborn for the physicians, and after

much suffering, which he bore with Christian for-titude and resignation, he died from hemorrhage of the bowels. Mr. Hurley was regarded as a most excellent workman, as was evidenced by the confidence of his employers and the esteem of his associates. Mr. Hurley was a widower, his wife having died about two years and six months ago, leaving a little boy then 5 mouthsold, who now resides wit his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Hurley. When Mr. Hurley was first taken sick the trouble was not considered of a serious nature, consequently his relatives in Maryland were not notified of it until a few days before his death. Upon receiving information of the serious change which had taken place, his sister went immediately, but unfortunately her brother had died before her arrival. In his last moments Mr. Hurley had every attention which kind friends could bestow. He had made many friends in the home of his adoption who, together with those of his native city and State, regret his death at so early an age. Senator Gorman's Dwelling Burned .-

Senator Gorman's dwelling in Howard county sit-uated about 2½ miles from Laurel, on the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, was totally destroyed by fire about 2 o'clock on Wednesday morning 17th inst. It had not been occupied since the early part of last October, when the Senator and his family removed to their Washington residence, 1701 Rhode Island Avenue, for the winter. M:s. Gorman, with her daughter, Miss Daisy, had gone out to the family homestead to be present whilst butchering higs was in process. Fire was kindled in the kitchen, as well as in a Latrobe stove in the sitting room. When night came the fire in the kitchen was extinguished and that in the Latrobe stove left there was thus no thought of fire. The night was very inclement and windy. About 2 'clock Tom Waters, a colored man servant, was awakened by smoke coming into his room. He has: ily arose and made an examination, when he discovered that the house was on fire near the kitchen ceiling. He at once awoke two colored women servants and directed them to awaken Mrs. Gorman, which they did. By this time the rear portion of the house was burning pretty rapidly. Mrs. Gorman and her daughter hastily jumped from their bed and made their exit at the front door, the only avenue of escape. Seeing that the house was doomed. Mrs. Gorman and Miss Daisy, scantly clad, were compelled to go to the residence of Mr. Hobbs superintendent of the farm, which was about oneclothing. Mr. Hobbs went at once to the fire and with the assistance of couple of colored men, secured the Senator's desk with some private papers and a few books and pictures.
