L Good Rule at Aparrow Point,—Mt. G. S. Griffith President of the Prisoner's Aid Association of Baltimore City, recently paid a visit to Sparrow Point, and he gives the following account of his I was delighted to find that the educational and religious culture of the people was not overlooked.
At present they have six organized congregations and four church edifices—the Presbyterian Conregation, with a Sunday School of thirty-five scholars, which holds meetings in the Public School House; the Methodist Episcopal Church, with a Sunday School of one hundred and a large church, Kev. Harry D. Mitchell, Pastor; the Episcopal Church, a flue building, with one hundred members and five flue Sunday School septiates. The Casholica have five Sunday School scholars. The Catholics have a fine large building with a Sunday School of twenty-five scholars; Rev. Father Leonard is the Pastor. The Colored Methodist Episcopal Church South has forty Sunday School scholars, Mr. E Andurson, Superintendent, and there was a colored saptist congregation organized one month ago, membership thirty, with a Sunday School of iwenty.
Mr. Wm. A. Baker, Superintendent of the Maryland Sunday School Union, and Rev. T. H. Jones one of its missionaries, have visited the Point and its vicinity and assisted in gathering in children for Sunday School instruction. Mr Jones devoting his time especially to the colored race. They have a population of about 2 390, including the colored inhabitants. The moral status of the place is excellent. Liquor cannot be sold within a radius of one and a half miles of the premises, and they only find it necessary to have one policeman on duty at a time, either by day or night. But few arrests have been made during the year and those for alight offenses, none necessary to be sent to court, he most frequent charge being for fighting. The Company have established a rule that all children from the age of six to fifteen years shall be compelled to attend a secular school, such agree ment being made with the parents before they are There are two public schools-one for the white children, containing 175 pupils, and one for the colored, which has 45 names on the roll, and 20 additional pupils will soon be admitted. They h-ve from 1,500 to 2,000 hands at work, and I was greatly surpassed to find the great improvements made by the Company in so short a time. In fact, it is perfectly amezing what they have accomplished. The manufacturing plant at the present me consists of four blast furnaces of which two are in blast a Bessemer plant and rail mill in course of construction, the marine department or ship yard, also in construction; machine shop, pattern shop and foundry partly completed and in operation; a brick manufacturing plant, with a capacity of 25,000 red bricks, is operated by the Company, The large plant of the Williamsport and Chesa peake Company, located on the property of the Steel Company, is an establishment not surpassed in extent and complete equipment by any Eastern 19 20 21 22 28 24 25 mills, and is now manufacturing lumber at the rate of 250 000 feet per day. With the exception of the lumber mill plant, no other interest is represented on this property than the Pennsylvania Steel Company. I was also surprised to see the hundreds of buildings erected, some quite large and handsome. They have also erected hovels and boarding-houses. The settlement for the colored population is entirely separate from the white and consists of sixty neat and well-built houses which rent from \$5 to \$5 50 per month, and twenty more will soon be completed. The Cottonsecd Oil Works of Antoine Badart Ayain Burned-Excellent Work of the Baltimore County Fire Department.— About 9 o'clock on Friday night, 19th inst., the cot-tonseed oil works of Antoine Badart, which are situated about 21/2 miles from the eastern city limits. and adjoining the grain elevator in course of erection at Lower Canton, was damaged by fire to the extent of \$3,000. While the workmen were getting ready to make up an order that was to be shipped on the following morning they discovered fire in a hose which leads to a very large filtering tank, which at that time contained about 7,000 gallons of oil. The flames having excellent fuel spread rapidly and when it was found impossible for the workmen to control the flames a man was sent to No. 8 Chemical Engine House, at Canton, Captain Fredk. Trow, to notify them of the fire. The alarm was immediately founded from the box, when, in less than one minute, No. 7. Capt. Henry Trishman, at Highlandtown, was dashing to the scene of the conflagration, reaching it in less than ten minutes. When the department arrived the whole of the main building, which contained the two filtering tanks, was a light blaze, and the flames seeking for more fuel had reached the cooper shop, distillery, boiler house and a private residence, which Mr. B dart us d as a private office. The firemen, obeying Fire Marshal Morgan's orders, immediately turned their attention to these buildings and by good management and hard work succeeded in saving them with but slight damage.
