

An Act against Burners of fences

Whereas divers of the Inhabitants of this Province have suffered much damage by the notorious, cruel practices of ill disposed and malicious persons burning their fences, And where as an Act of Assembly entitled An Act against Burners of fences formerly made and from time to time continued hath been found to be of great use and benefit of the Inhabitants aforesaid for the prevention of the abuses aforesaid Bee it enacted by the King and Queen most Excellent Majesties by and with the advice and consent of this Generall Assembly and the Authority of the same That if any person or persons within this Province shall wilfully and maliciously burn and destroy any corn field pasture ground or orchard or other fence whereby any of the Inhabitants of this Province are harmed and damaged the person or persons so offending being therof convicted by the Testimony of two sufficient Testimoniess willfully shall suffer such penalties or undergo such punishments as the Laws of England provide against such malicious persons and practices of that nature or make restitution to the party wronged by paying treble the Damages sustained thereby as the Justices before whom such cases shall come shall determine.

An Act Relating to the Seizure of Tobacco by the Sheriff
