Examined by the Originall Acts Remainning upon Record under the  
hands of the severall Clerks of the Assembly and the Chief Governour of  
this Province for the tyme being his assent made therunto at the end of  
the last sessions of Assembly, and the same so entered shall be sealed with  
the lesser seals and signed by the Honourable the Secretary and that  
his Honour the Secretary doo also cause a lych and Catalogue of the said  
Laws to be entered in the said books, and an Index or table of the prin-  
cipall matters therein contained to be made Alphabetically for the  
more easy and ready finding out the matters therein contained, and in  
default thereof by the tyme aforesaid the said Secretary shall pay as a  
fine for the same the sum of ten thousand pounds of Tobacco one  
halfe thereof to their Majesties for support of Government the other  
halfe thereof towards the building of a place to serve the Records, &  
when the same is so written and done the said Secretary shall at the  
next Generall Assembly be allowed and paid out of the Publick Treasury  
so much Tobacco as the said Secretary shall reasonably deserve.

### An Act for Quietting of Possessions.

Forasmuch as a good and beneficiall Law intituled An Act for quietting  
Possessions was made the seaventh and twentieth day of March in the  
Year of our Lord one Thousand six hundred Seventy and one in this Province  
which by the use thereof hath been found very much conducing to the  
benefitt of the people of the said Province, Be it therefore enacted  
by the King and Queens most Excellent Majesties by and with the  
advice and consent of this present Generall Assembly and the Authority  
of the same that all sales gifts <sup>and</sup> grants at any time before the said seaventh  
and twentieth day of March in the year of our Lord one Thousand six  
hundred seventy one and not after of any lands Tenements or  
hereditaments within this Province by any person or persons whatsoever  
that right had to sell give or grant such lands Tenements or hereditaments  
made by writing only with or without Seals shall for ever here after  
be accounted good and available in law to bar the heirs or assigns  
of
