ACT for quieting the Possession of the Passed September 3 Indians, inhabiting on Nanticoke and Chontank Rivers. and Choptank Rivers.

HE Nanticoke Indians shall, during their staying upon and not deferting the same, hold, occupy and possess a free, peaceable and uninterrupted Possession of all that Tract of Land, lying between the Northwest Fork of Nanticoke River and Chicucone Creek.

THEY shall not fell, dispose of, or lease for term of Years, any part

or parcel of the same.

THE Choptank Indians, during their Residence on and not deserting the same, shall quietly and peaceably enjoy that Tract of Land, lying in Dorchester County, on Choptank River, surveyed and laid out for them by the Commissioners appointed thereto by the Assembly; and they shall not, on any Pretence whatever, alienate, dispose, sell or let to farm any part or parcel of the same, (except what lies to the Eastward, Southward and Weitward of those Lines, formerly run from Secretary Sewel's Creek, to the bounded Tree of William Dorington) such Purchases or Leases, being by this Act declared void and nuil.

IT is Provided, that any Purchases from the Choptank Indians shall be made when they are tober, of found and perfect Memory, and the Confideration agreed for, paid or secured to be paid before executing the Deeds; which Deeds must be acknowledged before the Justices of the County Court sitting, or before one or more of his Lordships Council

else to be void and of no effect.

ACT for quieting the Differences that have arisen, and may hereaster arise, between the Inhabitants of this pro-Passed April 2 between the Inhabitants of this pro-8th, 1756. 5 vince, and the several Indian Nations; and for punishing Trespasses committed on their Lands.

HE Justices of the County Courts are impowered, in a summary Manner, upon Petition exhibited, to hear and determine all Manner of Controversies and Differences, Claims and Demands of what Nature or Kind soever, which shall happen or arise between the Inhabitants and Indians, in private and personal Controversies; and award Judgment thereon, so as the same always exceed the Sum of Twenty Shillings Sterling, and on such their Juagments, may issue Execution with Costs, as in other Suits.

And whereas, (notwithstanding the Laws of the Province,) severals have rented Lands of the Indians, without paying the Rent agreed to be paid; the Justices are likewise impowered to award Judgments, and issue Executions thereon, for the Rent that shall appear to be due.
