wherein no Essoin, Protection or Wager of Law to the Contrary in any wise notwithstanding.

PROVIDED always, that nothing herein contained shall extend to prevent, hinder or preclude any licenced Ordinary-Keeper, Merchant or other Person dwelling or residing in the said Counties, from selling any strong or spirituous Liquors at his or her Dwelling-House or place of Residence, during the Days on which such yearly Meetings shall be kept or held as aforesaid, so that such Liquors to be sold as aforesaid, (except what is sold by Persons duly admitted) be not drank at the Place where the same is Sold or exposed to Sale.

AND it is further enacted, that so much of the above recited Act, prohibiting the setting up and erecting any Booth or Conveniency, or selling or disposing of any strong or spirituous Liquors or other Accommodations, or giving any Entertainment to any Persons, at a Distance more than Three Miles, be and is hereby repealed.

This Act to continue during the Continuance of the above recited Act and no longer.

Both the above Acts are continued for the like Space of time, by Act passed 1754, and Act passed in October 1757.

An ACT to prevent Evils arising from the entring up Judgments upon Bonds, commonly called Judgment Bonds, to direct the Manner of issuing Executions on Loan-Office-Bonds, and to regulate certain Fees therein mentioned.

W HEREAS it has been the Practice to take Bonds, with power contained in the Condition of such Bonds, upon Non-payment, to any Attornies practising in any Court of Record within the Dominions of Great-Britain, to confess Judgment, and thereupon without any previous Process, Judgments have not only been confessed in the Provincial and County Courts of this Province, but also out of Courts before a single Magistrate, and Executions have issued thereon, to the great Damage of many People, who in Case Capias had issued, and they had time to plead to such Bonds, many Reasons might have been pleaded against the same; for Prevention of which Evils for the Future, it is humbly prayed it may be enacted.
