Mr. Digges delivers a bill, entitled, An act to authorise Henry Ashton to make sale of certain slaves; which was read.

On motion by Mr. Harrison, Leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to amend and reduce into one system the laws of descents. Ordered, That Messrs. Harrison, Lecompte, Wilson, Cause and Bradford, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

Mr. Gray delivers a petition from George G. Simmons, of Calvert county, praying permission to bring into this state two negro girls; which was read and referred to Messrs. Gray, Grahame and Weems.

On motion by Mr. Hynson, Leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to repeal an act, entitled, An act to encourage the destruction of crows in the several counties therein mentioned, so far as it relates to Kent county Ordered, That Messrs. Hynson, Neale and Eccleston, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

Mr. Johnson delivers a bill, entitled, An additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road from the city of Baltimore to Havre-de Grace; which was read.

Mr. Blakistone delivers a petition from James Cox, of Saint Mary's county, praying that a law may pass authorising the levy court of said county to levy a sum of money for the support of Elizabeth West; which was read and referred to Messrs. Blakistone, Jones and Watts.

The house proceeded to ballot for an Auditor to the state. The ballots being deposited in the ballot box, the gentlemen named to strike retired, and after some time returned and reported, that Richard Lockerman was elected.

The bill to authorise and require the trustees of the poor of Queen Anne's county to convey the land therein mentioned, was read the second time and passed.

The report in favour of James Hood, a revolutionary soldier, was read the second time, concurred in, and the resolution therein contained assented to.

On motion by Mr. Griffith, the house proceeded to the second reading of the report of the committee appointed to report the rules proper to be observed during this session.

On motion by Mr. Semmes, the question was put, That the word "uncovered" in the second rule be stricken out? Resolved in the affirmative

On motion by Mr. Blakistone, the question was put, That the word "uncovered" be inserted after the word "rise" in the third rule? Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Blakistone, the question was put, That the word "uncovered" be inserted after the word "place" in the 35th rule? Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Jenifer, the question was put, That the thirty-fifth rule be stricken out? Determined in the negative.

The report having been read throughout, as amended, the question was put, That the house adopt the same? Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Eccleston, the question was put, That leave be given to bring in a bill, entitled, An act for preventing a nolle prosequi to be granted in any case whatever? Resolved in the affirmative.—Ordered, That Messrs. Eccleston, Kell and Wilson, be a committee to prepare and bring in the said bill.

On motion by Mr. Garner, the question was put, That the house reconsider the bill, entitled, An act to confirm and make valid the acts and proceedings of William Redding, as a justice of the peace for Kent county? Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Kell, Ordered, That the said bill be recommitted to the committee who reported the bill for a vendment.

The bill to settle and ascertain the salary of the members of the council for the ensuing year, was read the second time and passed.

The house adjourns until to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.
