Be it resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the governor be authorised and required to a correspondence immediately with the executives of Pennsylvania and Delaware, stating at large the evances under which the citizens of this state labour, in consequence of the protection given in those les to runaway negroe slaves, and the difficulty which the owners experience in recovering them, even er they are discovered; and requesting the said executives to use their influence with their respective islatures, by recommending such laws as shall have a tendency to remedy the grievance complained of, I to report the result of the said correspondence to the next general assembly of Maryland
