Mr. Haynie delivers a bill, entitled, An act authorising the levy court of Somerset county to levy and assess a sum of money for certain purposes therein mentioned; which was read.

Mr. Kell delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Baltimore, praying to have restrained acts of cruelty upon horses, and other animals, in the streets of the city; which was read and referred to Messrs. Kell, Woodyear and Forrest.

Mr. Wilson delivers a bill, entitled, An act to repeal certain parts of an act, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act to appoint commissioners to grade and level the several squares, streets, lanes and alleys, in the precincts of Baltimore west of Jones' Falls, and to make further provisions on that subject; which was read.

The bill extending the benefit of the insolvent laws to Junis W. Moore of Montgomery county, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Forrest delivers a petition from Cassandra Wilcoxon of Montgomery county, praying support for her blind son; which was read and referred to Messrs. Forrest, Gaither and Washington.

On motion by Mr. Lecompte, Ordered, That the bill, entitled, An act to alter the time of the meeting of the general assembly of this state, and for other purposes, be made the order of the day for Tuesday next.

The bill for the relief of sundry poor out-pensioners of Anne-Arundel county, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.
