Mr. Pearce from the committee delivers the following resolution:

Resolved, That the treasurer of the western shore be and he is hereby authorised and directed, to pay the trustees of the Elkton Academy, in Cecil county, or their order, annually the sum of three hundred dollars, for the benefit of said academy, out of any unappropriated money in the treasury.

Which was read.

Mr. Downey delivers a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Catharine Freshour of Frederick county; which was read.

The bill to authorise the drawing of a lottery in the city of Baltimore for the benefit of the Baltimore Second Dispensary, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Buckey delivers a petition from the trustees of the poor of Frederick county, praying for an increase of the salary of the overseer of the poor of said county; which was read and referred to Messrs. Buckey, Hawkins and Downey.

The house according to the order of the day proceeded to the second reading of the bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act to establish a bank and incorporate a company to be styled the Bank of Westminster. Mr. Stevens moved to amend the bill by adding the following section: "And be it enacted, That if the president and directors of the said bank, or any of the officers thereof, shall at any time refuse or neglect to pay specie for their notes, when called on, at their banking house, then and in that event their charter shall be and is hereby declared to be vacated, made null and void, provided in case of such forfeiture the said bank shall be authorised to recover all debts actually due at the time of said refusal or neglect, as if no forfeiture had occurred, and provided also, that the said president and directors shall be liable to be sued for all debts due from said bank, either by bond, bill, note or otherwise, and all the funds, rights and credits, of said corporation, as held prior to said forfeiture, shall be answerable for the same"

On motion by Mr. Forrest, the question was put, That the said amendment be amended by inserting after the word "bank" in the second line the words "or branch thereof hereby authorised?" Determined in the negative.

The question was then put, That the house adopt the amendment proposed by Mr. Stevens? Resolved in the affirmative.

The bill having been read throughout, and amended, the question was put, Shall the said bill pass? The yeas and nays being required appeared as follow.

So it was resolved in the affirmative, and the bill sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Kell, Ordered, That the bill, entitled, An act to alter such parts of the constitution and form of government as relates to the representation of the city of Baltimore, and to allow two additional delegates from that city to the general assembly, be made the order of the day for Saturday next.

The bill for the relief of the poor of Caroline county, and the bill to authorise Arthur Craddock to bring a certain negro slave into this state, were severally read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Causin, Leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Richard Walker's three children Peggy Walker, Nancy Walker and Richard Walker, of Saint-Mary's county. Ordered, That Messrs. Causin, Jones and Blakistone, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

The bill to confirm the last will and testament of Lewis Cockey, late of Baltimore county, deceased, was read the second time, and the question put, Shall the said bill pass? Determined in the negative.

Mr. Jenifer delivers a bill, entitled, An act further to alter and amend the act, entitled, An act for the encouragement of such persons as will undertake to build water mills; which was read.

Mr. Gaither delivers a bill, entitled, An act to lay out and make public a road in Frederick and Montgomery counties; which was read.

Mr. Woodyear delivers a bill, entitled, An act to incorporate the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of Maryland; which was read.

Mr. Kell delivers a bill, entitled, An act to provide for the extending of Lombard-street in the city of Baltimore; which was read.

The bill to regulate the charges of tobacco inspected in Prince George's county, and the bill authorising the levy court of Baltimore county to levy a sum of money for the purposes therein mentioned, were severally read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Buckey delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of the town of Westminster, praying for a law for the regulation of said town; which was read and referred to Messrs. Buckey, Hawkins and Downey.

The house proceeded to the second reading of the bill, entitled, An act appropriating to the use of Chester Town a part of the tax on billiard tables. And on motion by Mr. Eccleston, the further consideration thereof was postponed until to-morrow.

The bill from the senate entitled, An act relating to election districts in the city of Baltimore, was read the second time, passed, and returned to the senate.
