The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were real. The additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act to incorporate a company to make a turnpik road from the city of Baltimore to Havre de Grace, and the bill to provide for the erection of a bridge

over Patapsco Falls at Ellicott's old upper mills, were sent to the senate.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill authorising the levy court of Somerset county to levy and a sess a sum of money for certain purposes therein mentioned; the bill to empower Thomas W. Griffit late collector of Baltimore county, to complete his collections; the bill for the benefit of Elizabeth John son, of the city of Baltimore; and the bill to authorise Hannah A. Hayes, guardian of the minor childre of Stephen Haves, late of Cecil county, deceased, to sell and convey all the right, title and interest, of said minor children, to certain real and personal estate therein mentioned, severally endorsed, will pas Ordered to be engrossed. The bill to provide for the removal of lunatic paupers from the several comties of this state to the hospital in Baltimore, endorsed, will pass with the proposed amendments; while amendments were read, agreed to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed. The bill to prevent geese as swine from going at large in the town of Rockville, in Montgomery county, or within half a mile there endorsed, will pass with the proposed amendments; which amendments were read, agreed to, and the ordered to be engrossed. The bill for the relief of the poor of Caroline county, endorsed, will pass many the proposed amendments; which amendments were read. The bill respecting the Susquehanna Cana the bill for the relief of Matilda Mercer, Stephen F. Donaldson, and Priscilla Donaldson, of the city Baltimore; and the bill to authorise the guardians of Henry Hammond, an infant, to apply the proceed of property for the purpose therein mentioned, severally endorsed, will not pass. Also all entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled An act for the relief of Elizabeth R. Snyder of the city of Ba more, endorsed, passed by the senate January 30, 1818; which was read the first and second time by cial order, passed, and returned to the senate. The resolution relative to the armory on the eastern show and the resolution relative to the colonization of the free people of colour, severally endorsed, assented Also the following resolutions:

BY THE SENATE, January 30, 1818.

Resolved, That the governor and council be and they are hereby authorised to designate and appropate such part of the public grounds in the city of Annapolis, as a scite for a monument to be erected the memory of Major General Baron de Kalb, in pursuance of the resolution of Congress of the 16th August 1780, as the person or persons who may be authorised by Congress to erect the same, in conjuction with the governor and council, may think most suitable for this purpose.

Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the attention of the Congress of the United State respectfully invited to the defenceless situation of its territory bordering on the waters of the Chapeake bay. The facilities offered by the boldness and ramification of its waters, to an invading foe, written in the history of the last war. Such a time of peace and national prosperity as the United State now preeminently blessed with, permits the collected wisdom of the constituted authorities to denote the most efficient system of defence, and allows the resources of the union to be applied to the future curity of the seat of the American government.

Resolved, ; hat our senators and representatives in the congress of the United States, he instructed

requested to use their best endeavours to effect the measures essential for the above object.

Resolved. That in the event of the United States establishing a Naval Depot at Annapolis, the States are river, or at any other place within this state, Maryland will cede, free of any expense to the grand government, the scite and territory adequate to that purpose.
