So it was resolved in the affirmative and the bill sent to the senate.

The bill for the benefit of John R. Magruder clerk of Prince-George's county court, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The engrossed bills No. 41 to 66, inclusive, were read, assented to, and sent to the senate.

The house proceeded to the second reading of the bill from the senate entitled, An act relating to British property liable to confiscation.

On motion by Mr. Beard, the question was put, That the words "common warrant, special warrant or" be stricken out? Determined in the negative.

The bill having been read throughout, the question was put, Shall the said bill pass? Resolved in the affirmative, and the bill returned to the senate.

On motion by Woodyear, the following order was read and adopted.

Ordered, That the bills from the senate be taken up and disposed of in the order in which they passed that body.

The bill from the senate, entitled, An act to provide for the conveyance and return of process issued from the courts of one county to the officers of another, was read the second time, amended, passed, and returned to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Lecompte, the question was put, That the house reconsider the bill, entitled, An act to authorise a loan to the state, and for other purposes? Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Lecompte, the words "in the Commercial and Farmers Bank, in the Farmers and Merchants Bank," in the 3d section were stricken out.

On motion by Mr. Lecompte the words "Commercial and Farmers Bank, and Farmers and Merchants Bank," were inserted after the word "bank" in the 5th line of the 5th section.

On motion by Mr. Lecompte, the words "and also the reserved shares of the state in the Mechanics Bank of Baltimore," were stricken out of the said section.

On motion by Mr. Eccleston, the words "in advance" were inserted at the end of the said section.

The bill having been read throughout and amended, the question was put, Shall the said bill pass? Resolved in the affirmative, and the bill sent to the senate.

The house according to the order of the day proceeded to the second reading of the bill, entitled, An act to establish a comptroller of the treasury.

On motion by Mr. Lecompte, the last section of the bill was stricken out.

The bill having been read throughout and amended, the question was put, Shall the said bill pass? The yeas and nays being required appeared as follow:

So it was resolved in the affirmative, and the bill sent to the senate.

The clerk of the senate delivers the supplement to the act authorising a lottery for raising a sum of money for the purposes therein mentioned, passed at November session 1810; the bill authorising commissioners to purchase a fire-engine for the use of the inhabitants of William's Port in Washington county, and the bill for the relief of Thomas Duvall of Prince-George's county, severally endorsed, will pass. Ordered to be engrossed. The bill to lay out and make public a road in Anne-Arundel, Montgomery, and Frederick counties, endorsed, will pass with the proposed amendment; which amendment was read, agreed to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed. The bill to lay out and make public a road in Frederick county, and the bill to lay out and make public a road in Frederick county, severally endorsed, will not pass. The resolution repealing a resolution passed in the year 1814, relative to the executors of James Earle, and the resolution in favour of Samuel Moale, trustee of Mark Alexander, severally endorsed, assented to. And a bill, entitled, An act to continue in force the acts of assembly which would expire with the present session, endorsed, passed by the senate February 6, 1818; which was read. And the engrossed bills No. 31 to 40, inclusive, No 51 and 52, from No. 67 to 71, inclusive, from No. 92 to 94, inclusive, and from No. 111 to No. 120, inclusive, severally endorsed, read and assented to; which were severally read, assented to, and returned to the senate.

The house according to the order of the day proceeded to the second reading of the bill, entitled, An act to provide for the payment of the loan made by the inspectors of the penitentiary, and for other purposes.

On motion by Mr. Lecompte, the words "provided the said tax shall not exceed two per cent on the amount of the sales" were inserted after the word "city" in the 3d line of the 2d page.

On motion by Mr. Lecompte, the word "twenty" in the same line and same page was stricken out and the word "ten" inserted in lieu thereof.

Mr. Lecompte moved to amend the bill by adding at the end of the 2d section the following: "And be it enacted, That the mayor and city council of Baltimore may and they are hereby authorised, to provide by ordinance, by granting on such terms as they may deem proper, special licences to sell wines, liquors, and other refreshments, during the time of performances at the theatre, and other places within the said
