The report having been read throughout, the question was put, That the house concur therewith and assent to the resolution therein contained? Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Martin, the question was put, That the house adjourn until to-morrow morning 9 o'clock? Determined in the negative.

The house adjourns until this evening 6 o'clock.

### WEDNESDAY, February 11, 1818.

The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill further to alter and amend the act, entitled, An act for the encouragement of such persons as will undertake to build water mills; the supplement to an act to empower and authorise the several county courts of this state to direct the opening or shutting up of public roads; the bill for the relief of Elizabeth Hutton of Baltimore county; the bill to authorise the establishment of an additional warehouse in the city of Baltimore for the inspection of tobacco; the resolution in favour of John Leeds Kerr, and Evans Willing, were sent to the senate.

The bill to regulate the manner of obtaining and altering public roads in this state, and the bill to incorporate the Havre-de Grace Ferry Company, were returned to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Forrest, the following order was read and adopted:

Ordered, That this house will sit for the despatch of business for the remainder of the session from 9 o'clock in the morning until 4 in the afternoon.

Mr. Forrest delivers a bill, entitled, A supplement to the act to provide for the administration of justice in cases of crimes and misdemeanors in the city and precincts of Baltimore; which was read.

On motion by Mr. Kell, Leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act relating to the levy court of Baltimore county. Ordered, That Messrs. Kell, Johnson and Price, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

Mr. Kell delivers the said bill; which was read.

On motion by Mr. W. R. Stewart, the following message was read, agreed to, and sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Bradford, the bill, entitled, An act for the relief of James M. Guire, of Queen Anne's county, was referred to the next general assembly.

The bill from the senate, entitled, A further additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act to incorporate a company for the purpose of building a bridge over the river Susquehanna near Rock Run, was read the second time, passed, and returned to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Forrest, the bill, entitled, An act annulling the marriage of Eleanor M. Can, of Frederick county, and John M. Can, late of Frederick county, was referred to the next general assembly.

The house proceeded to the second reading of the bill from the senate, entitled, An act to appoint a warden for the gaol of Baltimore county.

On motion by Mr. Price, the question was put, That so much of the said bill as has been read be considered as the second reading and that the bill be rejected? Resolved in the affirmative, and the bill returned to the senate.

The bill from the senate, entitled, An act to authorise the building of a bridge over the river Patapsco at the place called Hammond's ferry, was read the second time, passed, and returned to the senate.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill to authorise the vestry of Trinity Parish, in Charles county, to raise by lottery a sum of money for the purposes therein mentioned; the bill to authorise the drawing of a lottery or lotteries for the purpose of erecting a bridge in Frederick county; the bill authorising the drawing of a lottery for the benefit of Washington Lodge No. 59 of Free and Accepted Masons; the bill authorising a lottery to raise a sum of money to purchase a lot of ground in the city of Baltimore and to erect a building thereon to be used as an engine house by the Washington Hose Company, and to incorporate said company; the bill authorising the drawing of a lottery for the benefit of the Maryland Foundling Hospital; the bill authorising a lottery to raise a sum of money for the purpose of completing an invention in the art of war; the bill to authorise the drawing of a lottery in the city of Baltimore for the benefit of the Baltimore Second Dispensary; the bill authorising a lottery to complete Trinity Church and to build a parsonage house within the city of Baltimore; the further supplement to the act, entitled, An act for founding an academy in Hager's Town, in Washington county; the bill authorising a lottery to raise a sum of money for the purpose of building a Masonic Hall at Church Hill, in Queen-Anne county; the bill to authorise a lottery or lotteries in Frederick-Town; the bill to authorise a lottery to raise a sum of money for completing the Severn Church in Anne-Arundel county; the bill authorising a lottery for raising a sum of money to finish the Warren Meeting House and walling in the yard of the same in Baltimore county; the bill authorising a lottery for raising a sum of money for repairing or
