SATURDAY, February 14, 1818.

The house met. Present the same members as on vesterday. The proceedings of vesterday were read. The bill to appoint trustees for the sale of the real estate of James Lackland, late of Montgomery county, deceased; the bill for the relief of the heirs of Lawrence O'Neale, of Montgomery county; the supplement to an act to lay out and open a road in Prince George's and Anne-Arundel counties, passed Dec. session eighteen hundred and sixteen; the bill relating to the jurors of Montgomery county; the bill to authorise Mary A. Nelms, natural guardian of George Nelms and Ann E. Nelms to convey the property therein mentioned; the bill for the relief of sundry poor out pensioners of Anne-Arundel county; the resolutions in favour of Gen John Gassaway, Elijah Smith, and the message requesting the senate to modify their amendments to the bill authorising the levy court of Baltimore county to levy a sum of money for the purpose therein mentioned, were sent to the senate.

The bill from the senate; entitled, An additional supplement to the act entitled, An act to establish and regulate a market at Bridge town in Kent county, and for other purposes therein mentioned, and also to change the name of said place to Millington, was read the second time, passed, and returned to the senate.

The bill from the senate, entitled, An act to confirm and make valid the proceedings of the levy court of Calvert county since the year 1814, and for other purposes, was read the second time, passed, and returned to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Saulsbury, the bill for the relief of Thomas Johnson of the city of Baltimore, an insolvent debtor, was referred to the next general assembly.

The bill for the benefit of Hugh Foy was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate

The bill from the senate, entitled, An act to continue in force the acts of assembly which would expire with the present session, was read the second time, amended, passed, and returned to the senate.

The house proceeded to the second reading of the order relative to an additional compensation to the

committee clerks. On motion by Mr. Kell, the question was put, That the blank in the order be filled up with " fifty

dollars?" Determined in the negative. On motion by Mr. Woodyear, the question was put, To fill up the said blank with "thirty dollars?"

Determined in the negative. On motion by Mr. Neale, the question was put, That the said blank be filled up with "twenty dol-

lars?" Determined in the negative.

The cierk of the senate delivers the bill extending the benefit of the insolvent laws to Junius W. Moore of Montgomery county, and the supplement to the act to provide for the administration of justice in cases of crimes and misdemeanors in the city and precincts of Baltimore, severally endorsed, will not pass. The bill to incorporate the Roman Catholic Free School in the city of Baltimore, endorsed, will pass with the proposed amendments; which amendments were read, agreed to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed. The resolution for negotiating a loan; the resolution relative to the treasurer of the eastern shore; the resolutions in favour of Henry King, John Anderson, and Eleanor Lynn, severally endorsed, assented to. The resolutions in favour of Thomas M Barney, Aaron Simmons, Peter Glassgow, severally endorsed, dissented from.

The bill from the senate, entitled, An act authorising Marsham Parker, late sheriff, and Aquila G. Bowen, late collector of Calvert county, to complete their collections, was read the second time, passed,

and returned to the senate.

The engrossed bills No. 140 to No. 166 inclusive, were read, assented to, and sent to the senate. The bill from the senate, entitled, An act to incorporate a company to be called The Washington land Baltimore Canal Company, was read the second time, amended, passed, and returned to the senate.

The bill from the senate entitled, An act transferring the powers of the commissioners of the tax for Baltimore county and Baltimore city to the levy court of said county, was read the second time, and the question put, Shall the said bill pass?
