

Mr. Orrick presents a petition from sundry citizens of the state, praying to be relieved from illegal exactions of toll on the turnpike roads leading to Baltimore; which was read and referred to Messrs. Orrick, A. H. Price, Forwood, Maulsby and Showers.

Mr. Montgomery delivers a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act relating to insolvent debtors in the city of Baltimore; which was read.

Mr. A. H. Price presents a petition from a number of inhabitants of Baltimore county, praying to be relieved from a turnpike gate at the intersection of a road with the Baltimore and Harford turnpike road; which was read and referred to Messrs. A. H. Price, Orrick, Forwood, Maulsby and Showers.

Mr. Greenwell presents a petition from sundry inhabitants of Allegany county, praying a company may be incorporated to make a turnpike road in said county; which was read and referred to Messrs. Greenwell, Tomlinson and Blair.

On the second reading of the resolution relative to the donation heretofore given to the Harford county academy, on motion by Mr. Lecompte, the question was put, That the following be inserted after the word "Resolved" "That the resolution heretofore passed, granting a donation of \$500 to the academy in Harford county, be and the same is hereby repealed?" Determined in the negative.

The question was then put, That the house assent to the original resolution? Resolved in the affirmative, and sent to the senate.

The bill for the benefit of John W. S. Boyer, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate. The resolution relative to the school fund for Harford county, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Breckenridge presents a petition from Thomas W. Griffith, late collector of Baltimore county, praying time to complete his collection; which was read and referred to Messrs. Breckenridge, Luvall and Montgomery.

Mr. Montgomery presents a petition from the Baltimore Insurance Company, praying a continuance of their act of incorporation; which was read and referred to the committee on the petition of the Union Insurance Company.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill to allow Arnold T. Winsor, late sheriff and collector of Montgomery county, further time to complete his collection, endorsed, "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed.

The bill for the benefit of Mary Ann W. Haymond, of Montgomery county, "will not pass." And the resolution in favour of Jehu Chandler, endorsed "assented to."

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill to repeal an act, entitled, An act for the better protection of slaveholders in the several counties therein mentioned, so far as relates to Talbot and Dorchester counties, endorsed "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed.

Mr. Forrest delivers the bill further supplementary to the act, entitled, An act for amending and reducing into system the laws and regulations concerning last wills and testaments, the duties of executors, administrators and guardians, and the rights of orphans and other representatives of deceased persons, without amendment. Mr. Ross delivers a bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of William Morseil, jun.

Frederick county. Mr. Montgomery delivers a bill, entitled, An act to punish the offence of kidnapping white children. Mr. Marriott delivers a bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of Rachel Weems of Anne-Arundel county. And Mr. Jackson delivers a bill, entitled, A further supplement to the act, entitled, An act to incorporate a company for erecting a bridge over Nanticoke river at or near Vienna, in Dorchester county; which were severally read.

On motion by Mr. Dorsey, Ordered, That so much of the executive communication as relates to the Cumberland road, be referred to the committee on internal improvements.

The further supplement to the act for the distribution of a certain fund for the purpose of establishing schools in the several counties therein mentioned, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Montgomery presents a report from the president and directors of the penitentiary, which was read and referred to Messrs. Montgomery, Breckenridge and Maulsby.

Mr. Montgomery delivers a bill, entitled, An act further to continue an act passed at November session 1795, entitled, An act to incorporate an Insurance Company in Baltimore county; which was read the first and second time by special order, passed and sent to the senate.

Mr. Kennedy presents a petition from Thomas Davis, an old soldier; which was read and referred to the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims.
