THURSDAY, January 6, 1820.

The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. The amendments to the bill to incorporate the Mechanical Benevolent Society of Chester-town, were read the second time, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed.

The bill for the benefit of John Cowarden, of Kent county; the bill for the benefit of Joseph Leary and Julia Leary, his daughter, of Kent county; and the bill to appoint Gustavus W. T. Wright trustee, to sell and dispose of the land therein mentioned, were severally read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Millard presents a petition from Anthony Davis of Saint Mary's county, a revolutionary soldier, which was read and referred to the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims.

Mr. Marriott reports a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Richard Odle of Anne-Arundel county; and Mr. Wyvill reports a bill, entitled, An act to prevent free negroes from selling any corn, wheat or tobacco, without having a license for that purpose from a justice of the peace; which were read.

Mr. Gabby presents a petition from Daniel Schnebly, late sheriff of Washington county, praying compensation for services imposed by law, for which the fee bill makes no provision; which was read and referred to Messrs. Gabby, Kennedy and Kellar.

Mr. Hayward presents a petition from William P. Ridgeway of Talbot county, praying a special act of insolvency; which was read and referred to Messrs. Hayward, N. Martin and Stevens.

On motion by Mr. Coyle, Ordered, That Mr. Garner be added to the committee of elections and privileges in the place of Mr. Key, who is absent from the seat of government.

On motion by Mr. Forwood, the following message was read, assented to, and sent to the senate.

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, January 6, 1820.

Gentlemen of the Senate,

We have appointed Messrs. Peter, Brook, Norris, Warfield, A. Spence, Iiams and Millard, a committee on the part of this house, to join such gentlemen as may be selected by your honourable body, to form a committee of both houses for the purpose of comparing and examining engrossed bills.

Mr. Kellar reports a bill, entitled, An act for the revaluation of the real and personal property in Washington county; which was read.

Mr. Saulsbury presents a petition from Arabella Bayard, of Caroline county, praying she may be authorised to collect debts which became due to her in the lifetime and absence of her deceased husband; which was read and referred to Messrs. Saulsbury, Hardcastle and Willis.

The bill for the benefit of Rachel Weems, of Anne-Arundel county, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The house resumed the consideration of the report of the committee on the petition of Jehu Chandler, and the question was put, That the house assent to the third resolution proposed by Mr. Dorsey?

On motion by Mr. Boyle, that the following be inserted in the original resolution reported by the committee, after the word "claims," to wit: "For reprinting, folding, stitching, directing and packing, the votes and proceedings for the year 1811, for the use of the justices of the peace, and for any additional compensation for additional duties imposed on him as printer to the state by the resolution of November session 1811, No. 64, in printing the laws and resolutions, and votes and proceedings, for the sessions of 1812, 1813, 1814 and 1815."

On motion by Mr. Dorsey, a division of the question was called for, and put, as far as the words "the justices of the peace" inclusive. Determined in the negative.

The question was then put on the residue of the said amendment? Determined in the negative.

On motion by Mr. Lecompte, that the whole of the original resolution be stricken out, for the purpose of inserting the following: "Resolved, That the treasurer of the western shore pay to Jehu Chandler, late printer to the state, or to his order, such a sum of money as shall make his salary equal to \$1400 for each and every year in which he acted as printer to the state, (exclusively of the year 1811,) with the interest properly allowable thereon."
