Resolved in the affirmative, and the bill sent to the senate.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill to allow further time to the securities of Thomas Thompson, late collector of Dorchester county, to complete his collection, endorsed, "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed. The bill making valid a deed therein mentioned, endorsed, "will not pass." The bill for the benefit of Elizabeth Howard, of Montgomery county, and the bill to authorise the levy court of Anne-Arundel county to erect and establish a warehouse for the inspection of tobacco in the city of Annapolis, severally endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendments," which amendments were severally read, assented to, and the bills ordered to be engrossed. Also a bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act to incorporate the contributors to the Baltimore General Dispensary, endorsed "will pass," which was read. And a communication from his excellency the governor, enclosing a letter from the secretary at state, requesting four copies of the laws of this state for the use of the United States; which was read.

The house resumed the consideration of the bill to regulate sales by public auction, and after some time spent in debating the same, the house adjourned until to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.

SATURDAY, January 15, 1820.

The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

On motion by Mr. Wm. R. Stuart, the following resolution was read, assented to, and sent to the senate.

Resolved, That the governor be and he is hereby authorised and requested, to forward to the secretary of state of the United States, annually, four sets of the laws of the state of Maryland, for the use of his department.

Mr. Lucas presents a petition from John Paden, of Dorchester county, a revolutionary soldier; which was read and referred to the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims.

Mr. Duvall reports a bill, entitled, An act to make public certain streets in the city of Annapolis; and Mr. Breckenridge reports a bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act to incorporate the Patapsco Manufacturing Company; which were read.

Mr. Wm. R. Stuart, delivers the following report:

The committee to whom was referred the petition of sundry inhabitants of Queen-Anne's county, praying the legislature to pass a law appointing commissioners to lay out, straighten and make public, a road from the end of a new road which intersects the road leading from the head of Chester to Chester-Town, at Benjamin Duhemel's new house, to Chester river, to or near the Deep Landing in said river, and to make public a landing at or near the same, beg leave to report—that they have had the same under consideration, and are of opinion that the provisions of the act of assembly passed at December session eighteen hundred and eighteen, chapter eighty-nine, entitled, An act to regulate the manner of obtaining and altering public roads in this state, are sufficient for the good government of the same, and that the petitioners are respectfully referred to such tribunal. All which is submitted.

Which was read the first and second time and concurred with.

Mr. Lecompte presents a petition from Solomon Frazier, of Dorchester county, praying an allowance for undrawn rations during the revolution; which was read and referred to the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims.

Mr. Montgomery presents a petition from George Newcomb, of the city of Baltimore, praying a divorce; which was read.

The speaker laid before the house an additional report from the trustees of the Washington Academy; which was read.

Mr. Stevens presents a petition from Charles Gibson, register of the land office for the eastern shore, praying certain papers may be removed from the western shore land office to the land office on the eastern shore; which was read and referred to Messrs. Stevens, Brooke, Marriott, H. Hall and Peter.

Mr. Kennedy reports a bill, entitled, An act to stay executions for a limited time, in cases where property does not bring at sheriff or constables sales at least two thirds of its appraised value; which was read.

The bill to extend to John H. D Lane further time to complete his collection; the bill for the relief of Arthur H. Willis of Dorchester county; and the bill to make valid a deed of manumission executed by Thomas Carter late of Queen-Anne's county, deceased, except as relates to negro Harriott, were severally read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Greenwell reports a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of the heirs and devisees of Edmund Boyd and Ann Mary Boyd, late of Allegany county, deceased; which was read.

Mr. Forwood presents petitions from Samuel Barron, and Benjamin Marsh, and John Marsh, David S. Craig and Andrew Elston, praying certain deeds to them may be recorded; which were read and referred to Messrs. Forwood, H. Hall and Norris.

On motion by Mr. Orrick, Leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to correct an error in a deed of conveyance therein mentioned. Ordered, That Messrs. Orrick, Showers and A. H. Price, report the same.
