

The bill to confirm the partition of the real estate of the late Benoni Williams, as made by commissioners appointed by Cecil county court, was read the second time and passed.

On motion by Mr. Dorsey, the following order was read.

Ordered, That the treasurer of the western shore be requested to furnish this house with a statement of the annual revenue received in each and every year, from eighteen hundred and twelve till eighteen hundred and twenty, designating from what sources of revenue the same were received; and also a statement of the annual funds of the state, and designating what part of the principal is unproductive; also a statement of the probable receipts into the treasury for eighteen hundred and twenty, corrected by the receipts from the same items of revenue for the year eighteen hundred and nineteen, and any information which he can procure from the district attorney in relation to suits now depending to recover taxes imposed by the lottery law of eighteen hundred and seventeen, as to the time when suits were brought, if judgments have been obtained, if not, when the same will be obtained, and when it is probable that the state will obtain the money due thereon.

The bill to confirm the proceedings in the partition of the real estate of Richard Hawkins, late of Harford county, deceased, was read the second time and passed.

Mr. Orrick reports a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act to incorporate companies to make several turnpike roads through Baltimore county, and for other purposes; which was read.

On motion by Mr. Maulby, Ordered, That Messrs. Hayward and Breckenridge, be added to the committee appointed on the petition of sundry inhabitants of Baltimore county relative to a bridge.

The resolution in favour of Thomas Stallings, and others, was read the second time and assented to.

The supplement to the act, entitled, An act to incorporate the contributors to the Baltimore General Dispensary, was read the second time and passed.

The house adjourns until to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.

### THURSDAY, January 20, 1820.

The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The supplement to the act, entitled, An act to incorporate the contributors to the Baltimore General Dispensary; the further supplement to an act, entitled, An act to establish a bank and incorporate a company under the title of The Planters Bank of Prince George's county; the bill to confirm the partition of the real estate of Benoni Williams; the bill to confirm the proceedings in the partition of the real estate of Richard Hawkins, late of Harford county, deceased; the additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act to incorporate the Mechanics Bank of Baltimore; the bill relating to the Union Bank of Maryland; the bill to authorise the orphans court of Washington county to appoint a crier; the resolution in favour of Thomas Stallings, and others; the resolution in favour of the Medical College of Maryland, and the message relative to closing the session, were sent to the senate.

The resolution in favour of the Potomac Company, was read the second time, assented to, and sent to the senate.

The bill to correct an error in a deed of conveyance therein mentioned, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Polk presents a petition from Robert Pollitt, of Somerset county, praying a divorce; which was read and referred to Messrs. Polk, Schnebly and Garner.

Mr. Peter presents a petition from Sarah Tillard, of Montgomery county, praying remuneration for the services of her deceased husband, late a revolutionary officer; which was read and referred to Messrs. Peter, Dorsey and Marriott.

The supplement to the act, entitled, An act respecting writs of habeas corpus, passed at November session one thousand eight hundred and nine; and the supplement to the act, entitled, An act to incorporate the Patapsco Manufacturing company, were severally read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Schnebly presents a petition from James Eprenger, of Washington county, praying a special act of insolvency; which was read and referred to Messrs. Schnebly, Kennedy and Keller.

Mr. Kennedy presents a petition from Richard Pool, of Washington county, praying for a divorce; which was read and referred to Messrs. Kennedy, Gabby and Schnebly.

The message proposing to go into the appointment of register of wills for Calvert county, was read the second time, and so amended, as to propose to go into the election at 12 o'clock this day. It was then assented to and sent to the senate.

The further supplement to the act, entitled, An act concerning crimes and punishments, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The bill to authorise special courts of oyer and terminer, was read the second time and passed.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill, entitled, An act providing for taking the bond of John Stevenson, of Baltimore county, endorsed, "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed. And the resolution relative to the admission of new states into the Union, endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendment;" which amendment was read.

Mr. H. Hall presents a petition from Francis E. Monks, of Harford county, praying for a special act of insolvency; which was read and referred to Messrs. H. Hall, Maulsby and Norris.

Mr. Washington presents a petition from Mary Naylor, of Montgomery county, praying to be compensated for the services of her husband, a revolutionary soldier; which was read and referred to the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims.

Mr. Forrest presents a petition from Benjamin Greentree, alias Benjamin Marshall, a revolutionary soldier; which was read and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Hawkins reports a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of John Stemple, of Frederick county, an insolvent debtor. Mr. Willis reports a bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of Noah Ross, of Caroline county. And Mr. Showers reports a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Hannah Davis, of the city of Baltimore; which were severally read.

The additional supplement to an act, entitled, An act to provide for the organization and regulation of the courts of common law in this state, and for the administration of justice therein, was read the second
