MONDAY, January 31, 1820.

The house met. Present the same members as on Saturday. The proceedings of Saturday were read.

Mr. Wyvill delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Anne Arundel county, praying for an inspection house at Chew's Cove; which was read and referred to Messrs. Wyvill, T. W. Hall and C. Stewart.

Mr. Montgomery presents a petition from the judges, the bar and jurors, of Baltimore county court, praying a change in the time of holding the said court; which was read and referred to Messrs. Montgomery, Breckenridge, A. H. Price, Showers and Orrick.

The bill to build a bridge over Great Choptank River, in Caroline County, was read the second time, amended, passed and sent to the senate.

The bill for the relief of Henry Ellis, of Saint Mary's county; the supplement to the act, entitled, An act to regulate the manner of obtaining and altering public roads; the bill to provide for the erection of an additional wharf in the town of Nottingham, in Prince George's county, and for other purposes; the bill to incorporate a company to erect a bridge over South River, were severally read, passed, and sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Maulsby, Ordered, That the bill relating to the Baltimore and Harford turnpike road have a second reading on to-morrow.

The supplement to an act, entitled, An act for the distribution of a certain fund for the purpose of establishing free schools in the several counties therein named, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The house resolved itself into a committee of the whole on the bill regulating the mode of staying executions, and repealing the acts of assembly therein mentioned, and for other purposes, Mr. W. R. Stuart in the chair; and after some time spent in the consideration of the same, the committee rose, and the chairman reported the said bill with several amendments, which being read throughout, the question was put, Shall the said bill pass? The yeas and nays being required by Mr. Montgomery appeared as follow:
