Powell, Henry Meeds, Richard Chambers, William Orrill, William Potter, Henry Driver, James Houston, Jenifer S. Taylor, Anthony Whitely, John Stevens, Levi Dukes, Clement Todd, Lovren Dawson, George A. Smith and William Dilling, be and they are hereby appointed commissioners, with power to fill up vacancies that may happen in their board by refusing to act, removals from their district, or otherwise; and the said commissioners are hereby authorized and required to call on the treasurer of the western shore annually hereafter, and receive from him the donation of five hundred dollars, made to Hillsborough school, in Caroline county, by a resolution of 1811, which donation the said commissioners shall hereafter distribute equally amongst the several election districts in said county, in such way as in their judgment will best promote the education of the poor children in said county, so as to extend the same as equally as may be to such as stand most in need thereof.

Mr. Marriott delivers the following report:

The committee to whom was referred the memorial of Richard Lockerman, late auditor general, beg leave to report—that they have had the same under consideration, and find the facts therein contained are truly stated; that the books of accounts were not posted by the former incumbent, Thomas Harrison, for the last ten months, prior to his resignation; that said work has been necessarily performed by the memorialist, before he could ascertain the balances for the next year. Your committee therefore commend the following resolution:

Resolved, That the governor and council be and they are hereby authorized, to examine into the claim of Richard Lockerman against the state, for services rendered in posting the books of the auditor, and which ought to have been done by his predecessor in office, and allow him a fair compensation therefor, and to draw on the treasury for the sum allowed, and that the governor and council are hereby authorized and directed, to call upon Thomas Harrison, the former auditor of the state, to pay into the treasury the sum allowed by the executive to the said Richard Lockerman, and upon his not complying with the call of the executive within sixty days thereafter, they are hereby authorized and directed to cause a suit to be instituted upon the bond of the said Thomas Harrison, as auditor, for the recovery of the sum of money so as aforesaid by them paid.

Which was read.

The report on the petition of Thomas Karney, esq. was read the second time, and on motion by Mr. Boyle, the question was put, That the blank therein be filled up with the words \$500? Determined in the negative.

On motion by Mr. Kennedy, the question was put, That the same be filled up with \$300? Resolved in the affirmative.

The question was then put, That the house assent to the resolution? Resolved in the affirmative, and sent to the senate.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill relating to the funds of Allegany county school; the bill for the relief of James Earengy of Washington county; the bill for the relief of Francis E. Monks, and the bill further supplementary to the act amending and reducing into system the laws and regulations concerning last wills and testaments, the duties of executors, administrators and guardians, and the rights of orphans and other representatives of deceased persons, severally endorsed "will not pass." The bill to authorize John Cole, late sheriff and collector of Saint Mary's county, to complete his collection, endorsed "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed. The further supplement to an act, entitled, An act to regulate the inspection of tobacco, endorsed "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were read, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed. A bill, entitled, An act relating to voting by proxies in the banks of this state, and a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act for the benefit of the University of Maryland, severally endorsed "will pass;" which were read.

The house resumed the consideration of the supplement to an act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road from the line of the District of Columbia, where it crosses the post road leading from George Town to Frederick Town, through Montgomery and Frederick counties, to Frederick Town, and on motion by Mr. Harrison, the question was put, That the further consideration of the same be referred to the next general assembly? Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Marriott, Leave given to bring in a bill entitled, An act to prevent the destruction and waste of young timber and trees within this state. Ordered, That Messrs. Marriott, Wyvill and W. Hall, report the same.

On motion by Mr. Duvall, Ordered, That the communication from the executive relative to the resolutions of Indiana, be referred to Messrs. Duvall, Montgomery, Harrison, Forrest and Marriott.

The bill relating to the Baltimore and Harford turnpike road, was read the second time.

On motion by Mr. Harrison the question was put, That the same be referred to the next general assembly? The yeas and nays being required by Mr. Showers appeared as follow:
