Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Dennis, Leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, an act to declare and enlarge the powers of the court of chancery, and the county courts as courts of equity. Ordered, That Messrs. Dennis, Harrison and Boyle, report the same.

The amendments to the bill to revive and keep in force an act therein mentioned, were read the second time, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed.

On motion by Mr. Dennis, Ordered, That the bill to pay the civil list have a second reading on Monday next.

Mr. Garner presents a petition from sundry citizens of Port Tobacco, praying to be relieved from oppressive taxes imposed by the Hydrant Company; which was read and referred to Messrs. Garner, Jenifer and Dorsey.

Mr. Polk presents a petition from Gowan White, of Somerset county, praying a law may pass for the payment of his claim against the estate of Jonathan Heckman, a lunatic, to whom he was trustee; which was read and referred to Messrs. Polk, Boyle, Wm R. Stuart, Dennis and Duvall.

Mr. Breckenridge reports a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Rufus Eddy. And Mr. Montgomery reports a bill, entitled, An act relating to the salaries of the judges of Baltimore city court; which were read.

The bill for the relief of Margaret Danskin, of the city of Baltimore, was read the second time and passed.

On motion by Mr. Kennedy, the question was put, That the bill laying duties on licences to retailers of dry goods, and providing for the increase of duties on licences to retailers of spirituous liquors, and for other purposes, be referred to the next general assembly? Determined in the negative.

On motion by Mr. Duvall, the further consideration of the same was postponed until Monday.

The house adjourns until Monday morning 9 o'clock.

MONDAY, February 7, 1820.

The house met. Present the same members as on Saturday. The proceedings of Saturday were read. The bill for the relief of Margaret Danskin; the bill to repeal so much of the act to regulate lotteries as provides for the appointment of lottery commissioners and their clerk; and the resolution relative to the payment of the public debt, were sent to the senate.

Mr. Montgomery presents a petition from Noah Fowler and Charles Fox, constables of Baltimore, praying to be compensated for their services in apprehending and securing the Cotterills; which was read and referred to Messrs. Montgomery, Breckenridge and Kennedy.

Mr. Kennedy presents a petition from sundry inhabitants of Washington county, praying that certain parts of an old road may be shut up; which was read and referred to Messrs. Kennedy, Schnebly and Gabby.

On motion by Mr. Dorsey, Leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, A further supplement to the act, entitled, An act to regulate lotteries. Ordered, That Messrs. Dorsey, Spencer and Montgomery, report the same.

On motion by Mr. Beckett, Leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, An act for the revaluation of real and personal property in Calvert county. Ordered, That Messrs. Beckett, Kent and Wyvill, report the same.

Mr. Beckett reports said bill; which was read.

The report on the petition of Peter Gebhart, was read the second time and concurred with.

The bill annulling the marriage of Elizabeth Kreager, of the city of Baltimore, was read the second time and will not pass.

On motion by Mr. Stevens, the following resolution was read:

Whereas it appears to this general assembly, by the report of Perry Benson and Lambert Reardon, who were authorized under the authority of the house of delegates, to examine and report the situation of the armoury at Easton, that it contained three thousand seven hundred and seventy-one muskets, three thousand five hundred and fourteen bayonets, three thousand five hundred and sixty-two cartridge boxes, two hundred and seventy-two pistols, six hundred and eighty-one holsters, two hundred and ninety-one artillery swords, and many other implements of war, and that one fourth of the muskets are in a ruinous condition, the others in tolerable order, the bayonets are in boxes covered with rust, the swords, bayonets, and iron scabbards, are rusting to their destruction, the pistols are most of them in good order, except a parcel laying loose, dirty and rusty; there are also sixteen cannon, one half of which are in the armoury, the other half laying on the ground, subject to the abuse of idle people; some appear to be spiked, and their calibers filled with dirt and brickbats; therefore Resolved, That the executive be and they are hereby authorized and empowered, to have the arms and accoutrements at Easton, in Talbot county, cleaned, repaired, and put in good order, or such portion thereof as they may deem requisite, and that the sum of five hundred dollars be and the same is hereby appropriated for the above purpose, and that the treasurer of the western shore is hereby directed to pay the above sum to their order, out of any appropriated money in the treasury.
