The clerk of the senate delivers the bill to prevent bullet playing in Union town, in Frederick county, endorsed "will pass with the proposed amendment;" which amendment was read, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed. A bill, entitled, An act relating to the second election district in Charles county, endorsed "will pass;" which was read. And the supplement to the act regulating the mode of staying executions, and repealing the acts of assembly therein mentioned, endorsed "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were read.

On motion by Mr. Kennedy, Ordered, That the same have a second reading on to-morrow.

Mr. Dorsey reports a bill, entitled, An act relating to the chancery court, and the county and orphans courts. Mr. Garner reports a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act to incorporate a company under the name of The Hydrant Company of Port-Tobacco. And Mr. Polk presents a bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the relief of the securities of William S Handy, late collector and sheriff of Somerset county; which were read.

On motion by Mr. Stevens, the following order was read. Whereas the clerk of the house of delegates has presented to the committee of claims an account for issuing subpoenas and attachments for witnesses in the case of the Calvert election, in which he charges forty cents for each witness named in the subpoenas, and eighty cents for each witness named in the attachments; and the sergeant at arms a like account for serving the said subpoenas and attachment, which accounts the committee of claims, although precedents have been produced, do not feel themselves authorised to allow, unless so ordered to do by this house; therefore submit the following order:

Ordered, That the committee of claims allow to the chief clerk, — cents for every subpoena issued for witnesses, and — cents for every attachment issued for witnesses, in the case of the Calvert contested election, and that he be allowed the same fee for each witness whose name is in such subpoena or attachment, as if such subpoena or attachment had issued for each witness, and that the sergeant at arms be allowed for serving the said subpoenas and attachments — cents for each witness that has been summoned or attached.

The house adjourns until to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.

The bill relating to the chancery and orphans courts, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The amendments to the supplement to the act for the recovery of small debts out of court, were read the second time and dissented from.

The resolution in favour of public debtors, was read the second time, assented to, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Hayward reports a bill, entitled, An act to make valid the official acts of the justices of the peace for Talbot county; which was read.

The bill relating to vagrants in the city of Baltimore, was read the second time, and the question put, Shall the said bill pass? The yeas and nays being required by Mr. Dorsey appeared as follow:
