On motion by Mr. Dennis, the following message was read:

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, February 8, 1820.

Gentlemen of the Senate,

We have disagreed to those amendments proposed to the bill, entitled, An additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act for regulating the mode of staying executions, and repealing the acts of assembly therein mentioned, and for other purposes, which transfers from the magistrates to the judges of the orphans court the power of taking the supersedeas in all cases, on account of the inconvenience to which debtors, under judgments rendered by a single magistrate, and who are generally poor, will be subjected, by going with his securities from distant parts of their counties in quest of one of the judges of their judicial district, or one of the justices of the orphans court, for the purpose of superseding such judgment. We therefore return you the bill, with the amendments proposed by you, and hope upon reconsideration you will recede from the same, and amend the bill in such manner, as will give to the justices of the peace the power of taking supersedeas on all judgments under fifty dollars, and in such other manner as you may deem meet, without producing the above named inconvenience.

On motion by Mr. Quinton, Leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act for the recovery of small debts out of court. Ordered, That Messrs Quinton, Marriott, Forwood, Brooke and Lucas, report the same.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill relating to the Surgical Institution of Baltimore; the bill for the benefit of the children of the late William H. Dorsey, of Montgomery county; the bill to prevent swine from going at large in Union Town of Frederick county, and the bill for the relief of John Carey, of Worcester county, severally endorsed "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed. The bill to repeal an act passed at December session eighteen hundred and seventeen, entitled, An act to impose a tax on all banks or branches thereof in the state of Maryland, not chartered by the legislature; the bill authorising a lottery or lotteries for the purpose of finishing the Susquehanna Bridge now building at the Conowingo Falls; the bill to authorise the judges of the first judicial district to convey the lands therein mentioned, and the bill for the benefit of Robert Soaper, of Montgomery county, severally endorsed "will not pass." The bill for the relief of Susanna Teas, of Washington county, endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were read, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed. The bill providing for the valuation of the real and personal property in Charles and Dorchester counties, endorsed "will pass with the proposed amendment;" which amendment was read, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed. And the bill to punish the offence of kidnapping white children, endorsed "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were read, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed. Also a communication from his excellency the governor, enclosing a report of the general assembly of Ohio, relative to an amendment of the constitution of the United States proposed by Pennsylvania; which was read.
